

Lawson and Hess Resign from Boxing Commission

QUESTION OF MATCHMAKER IS UNSOLVED

Affairs of the new city boxing commission appear to be going from bad to worse. Following the meeting of last week, when members were unable to agree on a matchmaker and voted to await the selection of one for a period of 10 days to receive applications from various promoters of the coast, a meeting was held Sunday which resulted in another deadlock and finally in the resignation of Rex Lawson and Grant Hess.

Lawson and Hess both state that they were influenced in their action to resign through the desire to provide harmony in the newly formed commission. At the session of the commission Sunday the name of Frank Miles was again presented for the post of matchmaker, but negative votes by Lawson, Hess and Dr. Ray Oldenburg prevented favorable action. Other applications for the post were received from Eddie Arthur, former referee and former secretary of the Pelican City Community club; Benny Hodson, former fighter and well known local referee; and Henry Hansen, well known Portland promoter. Failing to reach an agreement on any one of the applications on file, Hess and Lawson decided it would be useless to continue, and filed their resignation with the city clerk, Roy Fouch. However, the applications were not acted upon at the meeting of the council last night.

Following the filing of their resignation, Lawson and Hess each received an anonymous letter, as follows:

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore.
Jan. 10, '31.

Dear Sirs:
Your action on the boxing commission has not so far met with the approval of the parties who are responsible for the Cofer administration.

You must line up politically or resign from the commission at once. You are not dumb as to what you are expected to do.

The letters were written on stationery of the Hall Hotel. The letters occasioned Lawson and Hess no worry, as they had filed their resignation before receipt of them. Two interpretations can be placed upon the letters. One is that the writer merely intended to throw a harpoon into the new administration of Mayor Cofer. The other is that some wag with an overdeveloped sense of humor merely saw an opportunity to "kid" Lawson and Hess by pointing out to them the fact that they were expected to bow to a given line in the affairs of the boxing commission.

The resignation of Hess follows: "This resignation is offered for the purpose of assisting you in harmonizing the commission. My acceptance of the appointment was made only after your assurance that the commission itself was to handle the policies contained therein."

The three remaining members of the new commission are Dr. Ray Oldenburg, Frank Miles and Dr. O. J. Johnson.

Joe Marcus, Portland sensation and main eventer in the Rose city, will meet Pothier, recent arrival from France, who in his two appearances here took fight fans by storm, on Friday evening, January 23, at Merrill. It was announced by Joe Bickerstaff, matchmaker, who is promoting the fight under the auspices of Tule Lake post of the American Legion.

Both the main eventers were signed yesterday by Matchmaker Bickerstaff. He also announced that Paul Auburnin, stable mate of Pothier and a main eventer in San Francisco, will appear on the same card against a local ring man who has not yet been chosen.

Gaston Fernandez, Ashland sportsman, will be manager for the two Frenchmen in the bouts.

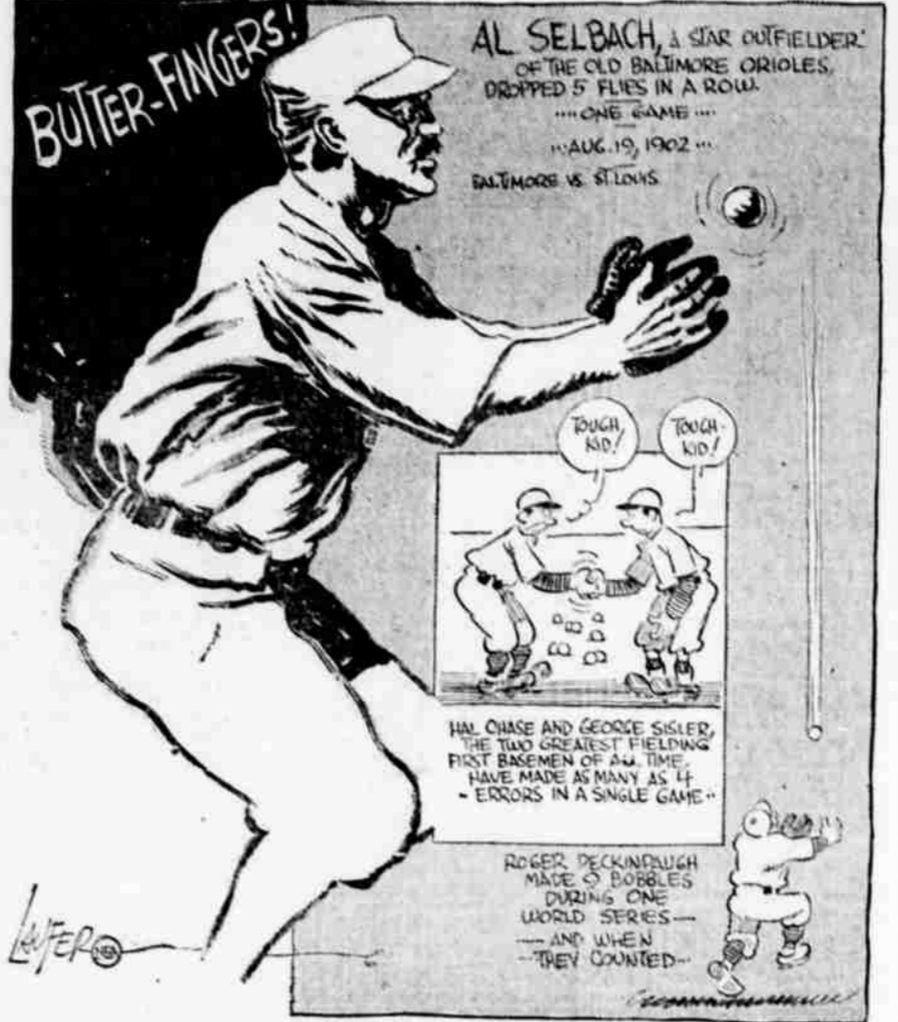
The fight arena at Merrill is larger than the Legion hall, is well heated and ventilated and Merrill is but a half-hour's drive from Klamath Falls, Mr. Bickerstaff said.

With a fight on in Klamath Falls over the selection of a matchmaker for the boxing commission, Bickerstaff at the instance of many prominent fighters, took advantage of the opportunity to again present Pothier in a bout and after some negotiations was able to secure Marcus.

"Prices will not be increased as the low overhead at Merrill will enable the fans to see the best fighters at moderate prices," the matchmaker stated.

Pothier in a fight here with Dixie LaHood won easily and as in his first appearance here he went the full 10 rounds without a drink of water or a second in the ring to fan him.

ED. DUDLEY WINS TOURNNEY

LOS ANGELES, Calif., Jan. 12. (AP)—Led by Big Ed Dudley, Wilmington, Del., professional, a chosen hundred of the winter golfing army today took the Rainbow trail to Aqua Caliente, seeking the \$25,000 pot of gold which awaits the winner of this world's richest tournament.

It was the smiling Dudley's fight to head the march, for yesterday he demonstrated a golden golfing touch by winning the Los Angeles \$10,000 open and the attendant prize money of \$3,500. Coming almost out of nowhere yesterday, this former Georgian gambled with his shots and won a champion's place in the sixth annual Los Angeles test by posting a score of 285 to lead the field by two strokes.

Dudley had never won a major tournament. Most of the followers said he was too good natured and easy going to reach the heights. For sixty nine holes his play went unheralded and almost without mention, although he had registered scores of 72, 73, 72 for the first three rounds.

As Big Ed came to the difficult sixteenth yesterday and downed a 39 foot putt for a birdie 3 and the gallery awakened to the fact that here was a youth who might take things into his own hands and settle the first place question. He did by making a champion's shot on the eighteenth which won the tournament. Behind a tree with his second he bravely pitched over to the Barranca isolated green.

STRIBLING IS FACING PLIGHT

NEW YORK, Jan. 12. (AP)—The complex heavyweight situation has reached the point where the fighters are being asked to sign not for one bout but for three.

The plight of young Bill Stribling, Mason, Ga., contender, might be taken as an example. Young Bill's father-manager, "Pa" Stribling, was all set to sign Bill to a title match with Max Schmeling in June. Now they're asking him to agree to two more battles in the event that Strib relieves Schmeling of the championship. They want Bill first to meet Primo Carnora in September, "they" being the Heart Milk Fund officials and Bill Carey, president of Madison Square Garden, unofficially. Then they would have Stribling agree to fight again in 1932 against the best available opponent for the Milk Fund alone. Under the terms of this three edged proposal, Stribling would post \$25,000 of his 12 1/2 per cent cut in the Schmeling-Stribling gate as

WALKER GOES OUT OF HIS CLASS TO WHIP LIGHT HEAVY

PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 13 (AP)—Mickey Walker, whose midweight championship was recently declared vacant by the New York athletic commission, went out of his class here last night and knocked out Matt Adgie, reigning Philadelphia light heavyweight in the first round of their 10-round bout.

It was the first time the Philadelphia had been knocked out. After Adgie had landed half dozen blows on his head and body, Walker bounced a left to the jaw that caused his knees to buckle. Another to the same spot had the leeman groggy. As another clipped him, Adgie hit the floor with a thud. The referee stopped the bout.

Neither a "miracle man" of football nor one of the old masters, Ingram, nevertheless, has a record comparable to that of any of the younger coaches. He is 34 years old, Graduate Manager Moonahan commented on his selection as follows:

"We have chosen Ingram because of his splendid qualities of personality and leadership."

Ingram was a backfield star for Navy from 1916 to 1918, being named All-American quarterback in the latter year. He learned football under Gil Dobie and in 1919 was recalled to Annapolis to act as the latter's assistant.

No mention was made of salary but it is believed he will receive at least \$10,000 per year, possibly \$12,000 and not more than \$15,000. It is understood Manager Moonahan was authorized to offer as high as \$15,000.

BILL INGRAM IS NAMED COACH OF CALIFORNIA

BERKELEY, Calif., Jan. 13 (AP)—University of California's Bears, once the toast of far western football, will bid for gridiron glory this year under the leadership of Snelling Bill Ingram, late of the U. S. naval academy.

Announcement of the appointment of "Navy Bill" was made yesterday by the executive committee of the associated students, ruling body of student affairs at the university. It was a mere formality as Ingram had been signed to a three-year contract ten days previously by Graduate Manager W. W. Moonahan, who went east last month empowered to select a new coach.

The new coach will take over his duties March 1. He already has sent word he will recommend one or two assistants, one probably E. E. Miller, present line coach at Annapolis. It is understood Jack Cheyny, now assistant to Knute Rockne at Notre Dame, is in line for the other assistant berth under Ingram.

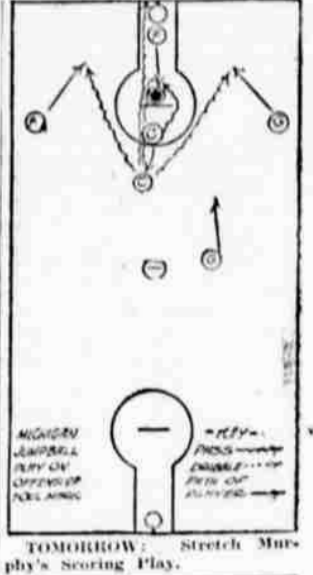
BASKETBALL PLAYS PLAYERS

Coaches should follow a definite policy on all jump balls. There are many jump balls of defense for held balls and insure possession of the ball more.

The Michigan jump ball play has been in use several years in the Big Ten Conference and is still effective. This play is best used on the offensive foul mark.

Notice the formation in the accompanying diagram. The center taps ball to (F1) and he taps it back to center who backs up two steps. Upon receiving it he shoots or passes to either of side players who may cut for basket. (F1) upon receiving tap from center may pivot and take a short shot.

On jump balls in the defensive end of the floor, the ball should be tapped to a spot away from the basket. If the ball should be tapped nearer the basket an interception would mean a shot by the opponents.

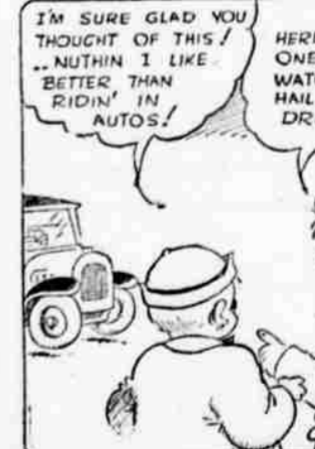

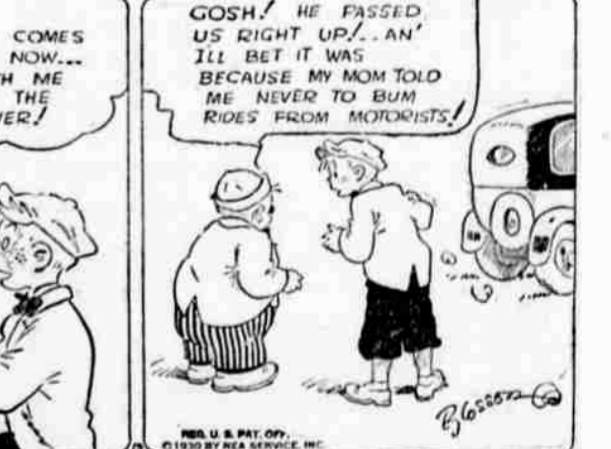
