

City Tax Levy Is 4.93 Mills Lower; County Tax Higher

Figures Released by Assessor Lee Reveals Total City Levy as Being 61.7. County Levy Placed at 25.10 Mills.

Klamath Falls' tax rate will be less this year but the general county levy will be higher than a year ago it was revealed when Assessor W. T. Lee released the city, school district and general county levy rates and amounts yesterday.

This year taxpayers will pay 2.70 mills more on county taxes than a year ago on a valuation of \$40,386,917.56 they will pay at the rate of 25.10 mills while a year ago they paid 22.40 mills tax on \$37,786,928.38 valuation in the county.

KLAMATH LEVY 61.7
Klamath Falls will have a total levy of 61.7 mills on a valuation of \$10,823,759.50, while a year ago the rate was 66 mills on a valuation of \$7,382,075. Chiloquin will pay a 3.6 mills higher rate. On the 1929 roll they paid 65.2 mills rate on a valuation of \$275,550. Merrill, which a year ago had the highest rate in the county.

FILE PETITION FOR REHEARING STATE TAX CASE

SALEM, Jan. 14, (AP)—Petition for rehearing of the case in which the supreme court's opinion invalidated the intangibles tax law of 1925, was filed with the court late yesterday by the state General Van Winkle. This is the case of Scott refiled and others against the commission.

Taking issue with the supreme court, the petition avers that there is nothing in the act to indicate that the legislature intended to impose an ad valorem tax on the intangible assets from which the income on which the tax is assessed is derived.

The petition then launches into an argument against the supreme court's opinion that the act discriminated against the individual as against the corporation. It is declared that the conclusion that the act is invalid on account of the fact that it discriminated between the individual and the corporation, and therefore denied to the individual the equal protection of the laws, does not follow from an interpretation of the terms of the act.

"At least," the petition states, "it is not shown how such a conclusion could be arrived at by that means without disregarding plain meaning of the terms thereof, and we assume it to be based upon a legal conclusion that a tax upon the income from property is, in effect, a tax upon the property from which the income is derived."

The sum collected under this law totaled \$594,583.35.

Special Rate To Coast Is Denied B. & O.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 14, (AP)—The Baltimore and Ohio railroad was denied permission today to make through one-way tourist passenger rates from Washington to the Pacific Coast and Rocky Mountain territory. The Interstate Commerce Commission, rejecting an application to sell through tickets via New Orleans, Memphis, St. Louis and Chicago, using first class rates to these railroads and low coach or tourist sleeper rates west of the Mississippi, said no emergency was shown and statutory notice could not be waived. The rates would have become effective tomorrow.

The Southeastern Passenger Association two weeks ago filed similar tariffs with the commission and was granted permission to sell through tickets.

The plan of the Baltimore and Ohio was to meet what it described as competitive conditions in the Washington district.

Slays Wife of British Captain

LAHORE, India, Jan. 14, (AP)—A former Sikh soldier who yesterday killed Mrs. A. G. Curtis, wife of a British captain, and wounded her two small children, was held today and will be charged with murder.

"I am a congressist (member of the nationalist organization) and I am going to kill the general," Sajjan Singh shouted, as he rushed on to the veranda of the bungalow, where Mrs. Curtis was seated.

After slaying her fatally with a sword, he attacked her two daughters, 7 and 6 years old.

They were on their way to Bend from Harney when the left rear tire of their automobile blew out.

Cold Temperature Hits Many States

TOPEKA, Kan., Jan. 14, (AP)—The coldest weather in Kansas so far this winter plunged the mercury to 4 degrees above zero early today at Concordia, and sent

temperatures below 6 throughout Northern Kansas and below 10 in Southern Kansas.

S. D. Flora, Federal meteorologist, said the worst of the cold was over for the present, and that temperatures tomorrow would hover around the freezing point. The cold was widespread, with snow recorded in Tennessee and a low of 14 below zero at Moorhead, Minn., with temperatures ranging from 4 below to 10 below in South Dakota.

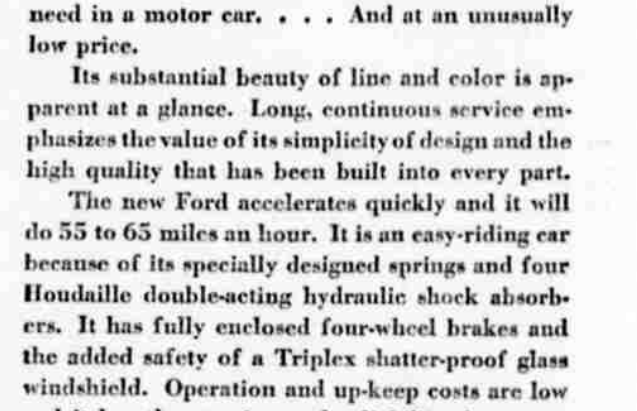
