For Results Use Herald Class Ads

Taxes Subject of Assessor Lee's Talk at Luncheon

Demand for the Best in Public Improvements and Institution Cause of High Taxes. Support of Governor Urged.

Taxes was the subject of an interesting talk made today by Assessor W. T. Lee at the regular forum-luncheon of the Klamath county chamber of commerce. The demand of citizens for the best in public improvements, schools and other public institutions was declared by the speaker as being the principal cause for a mounting tax rate.

His Address Follows
"The taxation problem is as old as organized society. Were it possible to see far enough back into the past, we would no doubt behold some hairy ancestor hurling his stone hatchet at the county assessor, if there was such an animal at that time, on account of dissatisfaction with his quota of clam shells."

Always Too High

"It seems, that from that period to the present date, the opinion of the taxpayers seems to have been uniformly the same, as to the levy. It was always too high. As society developed, and the ownership of property and commodities became more complicated, the problem of the distribution of the tax burden also became more complex. In spite of the many changes and developments in the methods of taxation, taxes have caused more pre-selection promises from candidates in the past, than all other demands put together. Probably more careful thought and sincere effort, has been expended in the solution of this problem than any other problem of government. And still the taxes keep going up."

Points Out Reason

"If we pause and take inventory of this matter to determine the reason for raising tax rates throughout this country, we find that the standard of living has

risen to such a point in America, that there is a motor vehicle for every four people.
"The state highway system of the United States, including construction and maintenance, operated at a yearly expenditure of approximately one billion dollars. The revenue to cover this outlay, all comes from taxes in some form or other. State highways do not include roads and streets in counties and cities. The cost of operation and maintenance of our public schools and state universities is constantly increasing on account of the increasing number of students. This is all borne by taxation."

People Want the Best

"Mr. Taxpayer is satisfied with nothing less than a seventy-mile

an-hour highway for his seventy-mile car. His boy does not plow through the snow on foot to the little old red school-house on the hill. He rides in a motor bus over a modern highway to a modern building scientifically heated, lighted and ventilated. When the boy finishes high school, he will go to the state university, operated on state funds. Mr. Taxpayer will hear of nothing less than the best educational facilities for his boy. The court house where Mr. Taxpayer goes to bring suit against his neighbor, or pay the taxes he kicks so much about, is as good or better than the one in the neighboring county. He insisted on this when he voted the bonds to build it. The old rented building that housed the post office in town for years is no longer adequate or in keeping with the best architecture in town. His congressman gets orders to hustle for an appropriation in Washington to construct a Federal building which is to be up to date in architecture and appointments. The city needs a sewer system and motorized fire fighting equipment. He votes bonds to supply these needs."

"In short, he insists that all departments of his government shall keep abreast of the times in equipment and service and shall function with the same efficiency as private concerns. In a nation that lends the world in the field of business and industry in the year 1931."

VERY INTERESTING NEWS

"The problem of the public official at the head of the government of a city, county or state, is similar to the problem of the business executive at the head of a private concern. This idea is getting across to the

voters as was demonstrated by the recent election of a business man to the governorship of Oregon.
"Our own country, Klamath, is now being operated as a going concern. From the County Court and Commission, down through the several departments of education, roads, health etc., the affairs are being administered with increasing business efficiency."

"The new governor has pledged himself to run the affairs of the state on a business basis. It is therefore essential that every official of this county, as well as every private citizen, should get behind Julius Meier, one hundred per cent, in his effort to make the State of Oregon a going concern, without regard to how we voted at election time. He is now the executive head of a concern in which we are all stockholders."

Here the speaker submitted a statement detailing the indebtedness of the several tax-releving bodies of the county, revealing the total bonded and warrant debt of the county, school and irrigation districts as amounting to a total of \$10,252,719.69.

"Now home—Klamath Falls and Klamath county. What makes credit? Stability—What makes stability? Webster says,

state of being stable, steadiness, firmness, equilibrium—
"In order that you and I get the real meaning of this definition, we must consider first ourselves, then our environment. The city of Klamath Falls has the best financial structure of any city in Oregon. Who made it? Klamath County has one of the cleanest balance sheets on the Pacific coast. Why? It is up to this body of men to see that these conditions maintain.
"Will I, as a taxpayer and not as a county official, be asking too much if I suggest that in the future, before any bond issue or public indebtedness be incurred that a committee, for which we have no law, be appointed of capable, outstanding characters from his body augmented from the interested parties; the issue be studied, analyzed, and their approval be final."
