SEN. STEWER PLEDGES AID ON SITE BILL

The board of directors of the Klamath Irrigation district today received a telegram from United States Senator Frederick Steiwer pledging his support to the McCormick site bill and thanking the board for the wire sent to him last night at the close of a called meeting.

After an all day session, the board of directors adjourned at 5:30 Wednesday evening. Late in the afternoon the board voted unanimously to place Bert E. Haney, Portland attorney in charge of the district's business at the hearing of the McCormick power site bill in Washington, D. C. The hearing is scheduled to take place on January 19 and 20 before the public lands committee of the senate.

Mr. Haney was given full authority to conduct the hearing, hire whom he sees fit as witnesses at the hearing, for a fee of \$1,500 in addition to the \$750 fee which is due him for work done to date.

Inform Congressmen—The district board also telegraphed Gerald P. Nye, chairman, that Haney represented them, and that the board is opposed to the releasing of any water with the site. They telegraphed Oregon's delegation, Senators Charles R. McNary, Fredrick Steiwer and Representative Robert B. Butler, urging that they use their influence to secure the passage of the bill, and notifying them that Haney will represent the district.

The hiring of Haney followed

a long discussion by the members of the board and some of the large number of water users who attended the meeting regarding the district at the hearing, and over the request of Director J. L. Jacob that A. M. Thomas, secretary of the district who was discharged January 6, be made the board's agent with power to act.

Oppose Thomas—E. M. Hammond, chairman of the board, and Director Sam Dehlinger would not listen to the request of Jacob to employ Thomas. Hammond said that once he fired a man that he did not hire him back and that he knew better men than Thomas to represent the district. Dehlinger was opposed to hiring a man "who hires himself" and attempts to dictate terms. He was opposed to giving Thomas full authority to act for the board.

Hammond and Dehlinger both declared that the district was not in the power business and that they have no intention of putting the district in that business. They stated that they were in favor of the purchase of the McCormick site, but did not state why.

Against Water Release—"Who said our land would be tax free if we had a power plant?" Dehlinger asked. "A man came around and said, 'Henry Semon, your land will be tax free; Sam Dehlinger, your land will be tax free.'"

Jacob replied, "It would be if we developed the site."

"And Sam would be foot free," Dehlinger replied. "The matter of an application to release 2,000 second feet of water to run the McCormick power plant if it is built was brought up. Dehlinger maintained that the release of water would not leave enough for irrigation purposes and Hammond said that with the dry year this year it may be necessary

for rotation to be practiced by the district as it is. Dehlinger also stated that application for the water weakens the district's fight to conserve water for irrigation purposes.

"As long as I am on the board I will fight against the release of any water," Hammond declared, and was given the approval of the large crowd of water users present.

Cites Finances—"We have to pay for the site within six months after we get it, and we are broke. In fact, we are worse than broke. We have to pay the government \$50,000 in April and we only have \$14,000," Dehlinger stated.

"What we have is land, and it wouldn't be worth a bogus iron dollar without water," Hammond said. "I tried dry farming."

Hammond contended that the first job for the board is to insure sufficient water for irrigation purposes. He was seconded by Dehlinger.

The water users and board, however, felt that with the hearing nearly here that the board should continue to attempt to secure the passage of the bill, as \$1,000 or more has already been spent.

Jacob For Thomas—Haney was placed in charge and made responsible for the hearing when the board could not agree on Thomas and when the board wished to appear in Washington with a unanimous representative. Haney, Jacob contended, could not get back to Washington in time for the hearing, and Thomas, he said, was the only one there who knows the situation and could present the district's side. It was then that the board endorsed Haney as its representative with power to employ whomever he chooses, after a telephone conversation with Haney.

Henry Semon, one of the property owners of the district and a prominent Henley farmer, stated that if the passage of the McCormick site bill was going to cost over \$25,000, he was against it.
