

REPORT SHOWS LOCAL LIBRARY MAKES GROWTH

The Klamath County Library, of which Miss Margaret Nye is librarian, reports a substantial increase in the number of its books, patrons and general circulation for 1930. The yearly report has been compiled by Miss Nye and shows that there are now 16,277 books owned by the library in comparison with 14,257 owned in 1929.

The circulation for the year increased 21,934 over the previous year. The number of borrowers is now 3425 as compared to 2335 in 1929. At the end of 1929 the library had 14 branches and stations in the county. There are now 17, of which the two largest and most active are at Chiloquin and Bonanza.

Chiloquin circulated 3408 books in 1930, its circulation for December alone being 1070, and Bonanza circulated 4250 books during the year.
