ELECTION OF OFFICERS HELD

The members of the board of directors of the Klamath Poultry Producers' association were re-elected for the coming year at the annual meeting of the association held Saturday in the office of C. A. Henderson, county agent.

Friday the board will meet to select officers for the coming year from among its members, composed of L. Alva Lewis, D. E. Alexander, Earl Mack, Dr. F. M. Trout and L. B. Dawson.

The members decided that at the present time they will not merge the poultry producer's association with the dairy co-operatives. They discussed, instead, the value and possibility of the association purchasing supplies for the members through the formation of a joint stock company. Action on this matter was left up to the board of directors.

The reports presented showed a great growth in the business of the association during the past year. At the present time there are 70 members; the financial condition is good and shows a gain over a year ago. The amount of eggs handled during the year showed a large increase and the price of eggs on the local market was stabilized.

Another report shows that Klamath poultrymen now produce only about one-third of the amount of poultry and eggs used in the Klamath district.
