Scores Spent Sunday Skiing and Coasting In Ft. Klamath and Anna Springs Areas. Roads in Good Condition

Winter thrills galore and not a few spills were provided sport fans who visited Fort Klamath yesterday and were shown Klamath's own winter playground. Scores of people from this city motored almost as far as Anna Springs camp to enjoy skiing, tobogganing and coasting. An expert ski instructor was on hand to give lessons to those who experienced their first thrill on skis.

A large group of Fort Klamath men, members of the Crater Lake Ski club who are promoting interest in the annual ski race February 22, were busily engaged in hauling timber, clearing the roads and in keeping up the huge bonfire built near the ski slides.

The roads were open within one mile of Anna Springs camp yesterday. Motorists were able to drive the entire distance, although chains were needed, and experienced no difficulty at all. Ample parking space for the cars was afforded. The balance of the road as far as the camp, will be opened by the time of the races, officials stated. From Anna Springs to Crater Lake the road is continually kept open by the huge snow plows.

DEATH TAKES NEGRO FROM ANGRY WHITES

SHREVEPORT, La., Jan. 19. (AP)—Death in the form of peritonitis claimed Lemuel McDaniels, negro, at midnight, and dispersed a mob of 1,500 persons, who milled about the hospital where he was being treated for wounds suffered in a police gun fight. The shooting was fatal to two officers.

A few members of the crowd climbed an unguarded fire escape to the negro ward on the third floor, but left after three of the group had been called into the negro's room by Dr. E. L. Sanderson, superintendent, and shown the body.

The entire police force, augmented by all available sheriff's deputies and a score of city firemen, held most of the crowd to the ground floor.

Mayor J. G. Palmer, Sheriff Tom Hughes and Capt. Harry Stahl of the national guard unit here, made speeches.

The negro was brought to the hospital after a raid Saturday night upon his grocery which was led by three policemen wearing old clothes and faces blackened. The officers said they suspected the grocery of hiding a gambling den.

In the battle, Teddy Williams, policeman, was shot dead, and Lee Allen Williams, his fellow officer, was wounded fatally. McDaniels denied shooting the officers, naming another negro as the slayer. This negro was arrested and spirited away to a jail. S. A. Jones, the third policeman, escaped the bullets by lying on the grocery floor. He said McDaniels fired the fatal shots.

The first shots were fired from the grocery. Police said they believed the negroes mistook the blackfaced policemen for bandits.

Robinson and Senator Black, democrat, Alabama.

It is now up to the house, where republicans leave doubt their ability to uphold President Hoover (who is opposed to the government appropriation).

The Reed amendment to withhold the fund was rejected by 52 to 50.

The Robinson proposal was approved by 58 to 27. Democrats unitedly supported the \$25,000,000 fund. Twenty republicans and the farmer-labor senator, Shipstead, also voted for it.

The opposition lacked the one-third necessary to sustain a veto if the issue comes to that.
