

NEW BOXING COMMISSION IS SELECTED

W. M. Montellus, William Davall and William Baum were appointed members of the city boxing commission by Mayor F. H. Cofer at the city council meeting last night. The appointments were approved by the council.

The three new members will take the places of Rex Lawson, Grant Hess and Frank Miles who have resigned within the past two weeks. It is understood that Miles resigned from the commission within the past days.

Approve Police Force
The list of the present police force, as appointed by Stanley Jones, chief of police, was submitted and approved by the council. The force includes Guy Merrill, captain; John Kenworthy, day desk sergeant; Sam Handley, patrolman and poundmaster; Gilbert D. Hayes and Ray Lyons, patrolmen for the prowl car; S. P. Reed and Joe Folsom, motorcycle; H. D. Williamson and C. K. Cook, patrolmen in charge of traffic; G. T. McDonald, Charles C. Duggan, Clarence Coon and Charles A. Anderson, patrolmen.

Award Bids
Bids were awarded the Smith Tire company to furnish the city with tires. Shell Oil company for gas and oil and K cafe for meals for city prisoners upon recommendation of the finance committee, and ordinances were passed to first reading authorizing the mayor and police judge to enter into contracts with the Shell Oil company for gas and oil and the K cafe for meals for entering into a contract for tires will be submitted next week.

Suggests Change
Chief of Police Jones appeared before the council and suggested the police commission in charge of street traffic conditions on Main street and recommend some improvements.

Need Street Signs
Councilman Van Camp brought up the matter of street signs which are badly needed in the city and stated that he had made investigations and found some signs can be procured which would cost only about \$3 apiece. The council was in favor of the plan and the matter was submitted to the street committee.

Van Camp also stated that a check be made on the number of street lights now installed in the city, which was referred to the light committee.

Ask Aid for Home
A letter was read and turned over to the finance committee from the Warrenton baby home in Portland, requesting that \$10 be donated from Klamath Falls for a new fireproof baby home. It was pointed out that this is the first time the home has sought aid outside of Multnomah county, but since it cares for infants from all parts of the state, the same request is being made of every city in Oregon.

Submit Sites
Several additional sites were submitted as favorable locations for the new municipal fire station and were placed on file. Eight different lots in Second Hot Springs and Railroad additions were submitted by C. C. Kelley, and two lots by W. M. Montellus. These were placed on file.

Grant Permits
Permits to operate during the coming year were granted to the Willard, Baldwin, Babcock and Klamath hotels, Klamath Annex, Shasta and Gem Rooms, Pastime pool hall, the Mint, the Spar, Klamath Billiard company, Clyde's hamburger and lunch counter, and Oriental cafe. An application from the Home cafe was rejected.

Councilman Driscoll asked what was going to be done about rooming houses that are continuing to operate after their licenses have been rejected, and pointed out that in case of a fire the city might be held liable.

Roy Fouch, police judge, stated that he had already notified the Holland House and the Liberty rooms to make improvements within 30 days or they would be closed.

Six building permits, totaling \$1,860, were allowed. Following adjournment, the council visited the fire department in a body and looked over the cleaning and refinishing

UNIFORMITY IN CITY LAWS IS PLAN OF LEAGUE

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 20, (AP)—Enactment of a group of ten bills sponsored by the League of Oregon Cities as its present program will be asked of the 36th legislative assembly, William Briggs of Ashland, chairman of the legislative committee of the league, and a former member of the house of representatives, announced today.

The joint senate committee on municipal affairs and the house committee on counties and cities will be asked to introduce the measures. The program was formulated after meetings in Portland during the past few months, and he said is desired by a majority of city members of the league.

The measures include the enactment of a state-wide building code, affecting plumbing, heating, wiring and general construction. They also seek to have the state highway commission meet a portion of expense and maintenance of highways through the city limits, the argument being raised that at present the cities receive nothing in return for licenses and gasoline taxes.

Other proposals are to change the Banquet assessment payments to be paid semi-annually, instead of annually as at present; distribution of road funds to permit the cities to receive back 75 percent of 50 percent of the real levy; re-enact state laws by city ordinance to conform to existing statutes and printed codes, thus simplifying procedure; creation of a sinking fund in advance for equipment, erection of municipal buildings and garbage of sewage disposal plants; blanket foreclosure suits to quiet title in city cities, enabling the city to bring one suit against a group instead of proceeding against individual defendants; proscribing the method for foreclosing delinquent assessment liens by cities; protecting liens against municipal tax sales; making more workable the statutes covering annexation or acquisition of lands and exempting cities in the payment of penalty and interest on delinquent taxes to the state on lands owned or acquired by the cities.

Ramsey MacDonald Welcomes India as A Full Dominion

LONDON, Jan. 20, (AP)—Ramsey MacDonald today brought the Indian round table conference to a close, extending a welcoming hand to India as a full dominion in the British commonwealth of nations with full responsible self-government.

The work begun at London will be continued without interruption, he said, and the new Indian constitution will be passed through the British parliament as soon as it is completed.

This pronouncement of British policy pledged liberation to India's 50,000 political prisoners if "civil quiet is proclaimed and assured" in India.
