

MISS BOW HAS LITTLE LEFT OF BIG SALARY

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 20. (AP)—Motion picture star Clara Bow, a princely sum for what the film fans call "H", but all she saved, Daisy De Bow said today, was what the actress' former secretary put out of the reach of the demands of a gay life.

Taking the witness stand to complete her testimony begun Friday, Miss De Bow under red-hot examination by counsel, Nathan O. Freedman, said that when Clara hired her out of a film beauty shop in January, 1929, the actress had \$20,000 in a trust fund.

"She was getting \$2,000 a week then," Miss De Bow related at the noon recess. "I arranged the fund so that she couldn't draw anything from it and during the sixteen months I was with her, I managed so she could put \$137,000 more in it. Some months she employed me, she was given \$4,000 a week and when we broke up last November she was getting \$5,000 a week. When I left she had \$227,000 in that trust fund and I think that's all she's got now."

The state opened today's session of the trial by calling Miss De Bow for further examination. The prosecutors renewed their attempt to establish her alleged guilt by asking her if she did not suggest to Clara that they each buy Alfred Mathes, Daisy's boy friend, a birthday present and then draw on the actress' account to pay for both gifts. "I did not," she replied with firmness, contrary to her testimony before the grand jury last November.

The state accused her and Freedman drew out her story about the money she accumulated for the actress. She said she paid for scores of bills incurred by Clara, among them a \$400 "hook-making machine." No sooner had she enumerated this last purchase than Judge William Doran ordered it stricken. He told the attorneys yesterday that he was tired of "mud slinging" and wanted no more of it.

She left the witness stand and a string of witnesses, including her sister, Mrs. Grace Black, followed to recount varied instances of money they claimed she spent out of her own account to pay Clara's bills and frequent attorneys by the actress. That "Daisy is a fine girl and she's proved to be more satisfactory than I'd ever hoped."

NON-PARTISAN JUDICIARY IS CONTEMPLATED

SALEM, Jan. 20. (AP)—A bill providing for a non-partisan judiciary in Oregon is now being drafted by the legislative committee of the Oregon Bar Association and the Multnomah Bar Association. Together with a number of other measures being sponsored by those organizations it will be introduced in the senate, probably this week.

The legislative committee of the two associations met in Salem last night for final decision on bills to be sponsored, and also some recommended by the state judicial council that the two associations will oppose. Arthur K. McMahon of Albany is chairman of the committee of the state association and John P. Reddy of Portland is chairman of the Multnomah association.

Other provisions of measures to be sponsored by the associations are: Restoring the authority of the chief justice of the supreme court to assign judges to districts other than their own; empowering trial judges to instruct juries in writing before argument; authorizing trial judges, when there is no bona fide dispute as to fact, to give rules of evidence; clarifying the existing law relative to the necessity of witnesses in execution of chattel mortgages.

The associations also will sponsor a measure giving the accused in criminal cases to waive trial by jury, except cases punishable by life imprisonment or death. This is the only measure recommended by the state judicial council with which the bar associations are in agreement.

LAWMAKERS AWAITING MEIER BILL

Grange Bill About Ready

The Grange bill, which is an enabling act to bolster up the water and power utility district amendment adopted by the people at the November election, is also being introduced late today or tomorrow in final form and probably tomorrow.

The selection of nine directors of appointment of the governor for the Port of Portland is provided in the bill introduced by Representatives Kenney, Gill, Lewis and Gordon and Senators Woodward, Bennett and Staples. It bears the emergency clause and would be effective as soon as signed by the governor. The original act named the nine members of the board.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 20. (AP)—President Hoover accepted an invitation today to dedicate the Harding Memorial at Marion, Ohio, some time after May.

The invitation was formally extended by Foster Senator Frelinghuysen of New Jersey, chairman of the Harding Memorial commission. He said Calvin Coolidge also would be invited to attend the ceremonies.

The exact date for the dedication has not been fixed but it will be some time during the summer.

President Hoover recently indicated that he would participate in the ceremonies if formally invited.

'Booze King' Voluntarily Surrenders

PORTLAND, Jan. 20. (AP)—Joe Brown, more properly but less well known as Nicholas A. Tringias, walked into the office of the United States marshal late yesterday, said "Well, here I am," deposited \$5,000 bail and walked out again.

This ended a four-months' search for the man whom police officers here sometimes refer to as one of Oregon's "king bootleggers."

Brown has been sought in connection with the liquor conspiracy indictments returned Sept. 20, against Walter L. Toomey Jr., prominent Portland attorney, and 34 other defendants.

AMENDMENTS GIVEN O. K. BY CHAMBER

R. C. Grossbeck submitted to the directors of the chamber of commerce at today's regular meeting an act to amend the present banking act, an amendment to the constitution on the six percent tax limitation and an act to create a tax conservation and supervisory committee in each county in the state of Oregon.

Mr. Grossbeck briefly outlined the different points in these acts for amendment, and upon motion, the amendments were submitted to the legislative committee.

These bills will be forwarded at once to the representatives from this district in the state legislature at Salem.

Telegrams from Senators Steiwer and McNary were read at the board meeting of the directors this noon. These telegrams were in answer to requests from the chamber for cooperation and support in requests for appropriations for the Weed-Klamath Falls interstate highway. Both senators pledged their support and cooperation to the construction of this road, which would complete the Dalles-California highway.

Directors of the Klamath county chamber of commerce today went on record as favoring the passage of a bill to be presented at the present legislature, asking for the appropriation of \$50,000 for increased advertising for the state of Oregon. Cooperation of the local chamber was asked by W. G. Ide, secretary and manager of the state chamber of commerce.

Introduce Bill For Free School Books

SALEM, Jan. 20. (AP)—The free text book measure, carrying the signatures of fifteen representatives and eleven senators, providing for supplying all grade and high school students with free books, was introduced in the house late today. The bill provides that the books may be purchased direct from the publishers, through the board of education by districts, providing a price is not in excess of that paid by the state board.

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 20. (AP)—Willis K. Clark, president of the Portland stock and bond exchange, announced today that the board of governors of the exchange has decided to suspend operations on February 1.

The exchange will remain closed, his statement said, "until such time as the general conditions of security markets in the country, and the particular situation in Portland, justifies a re-establishment of an exchange in this city."
