## STEEL CO. HEAD WARNS AGAINST CUTTING WAGES

CHICAGO, Jan. 20. (AP)—The pendulum of industrial activity, in the belief of James A. Farrell, president of the United States Steel corporation, is swinging back to normal.

The broad shouldered, white-haired head of the two billion dollar steel concern expressed his opinion in an address on "business" before the national chambers and national wholesale grocers.

Declaring that in his opinion the "peak of the depression passed 20 days ago," the speaker said the time has now come for "greater enterprise in trade—for loosening up business," adding that "we are quite capable of doing 1930." His opposed wage reductions.

"There are some," he said, "who urge a reduction in wages corresponding to the drop in prices. They affect to believe that such a liquidation of labor would hasten a return to normal conditions."

"Apparently those who advocate this solution have not stopped to consider the implications that, instead of tending to increase consumption of industrial and agricultural products, such wage reductions must inevitably reduce the purchasing power of the wage earner and restrict consumption."

"It is my deliberate judgment that a general reduction of wages in this country would set back the impending recovery by at least two years."

Turning to the agricultural situation, Farrell described it as "most serious" quite apart from the conditions in the manufacturing industries.

Nothing, he said, could be gained by agriculture "by resort to quick nostrums and unsound economics. The most plausible economic fallacy that ever has been presented to the human race is the old and often exploded one that value can be created by legislation. Every time that has been tried throughout the long years of history it has resulted in disaster, no matter who tried it or when or where. We couldn't do it with greenbacks, Germany couldn't do it with marks. It cannot be done by the farmer."

## Today in Klamath's Theatres

Walter Huston, Paramount featured player who triumphed most recently in "Abraham Lincoln," and whose performance as the "general" in "The Virtuous Sin," opening at the Pine Tree theatre, marks him as the latest qualified neophyte to the ranks of individual stars. He is a native of Canada. When he was 15 years old he left his home in Toronto with a travelling show. The show soon went on the rocks and Huston rode a freight train into New York.

After making the rounds of all the theatrical agencies he obtained a place in the cast of a company playing "In Convict Stripes," a melodrama by Hal Reid, father of the late Wallace Reid.

When that engagement was ended he toured the country with a company playing "The Sign of the Cross."

In 1905, Huston left the stage, going to Nevada, Mo., where he took charge of the city water and electrical plants. As a youth he had become a good practical engineer and this experience not only enabled him to handle the position at Nevada but won him a city engineer's license in St. Louis.

He returned to the dramatic stage in the play, "Mr. Pitt," which ran at the 35th street theatre, New York. Next came an engagement with a Shubert road show revue.

Returning to New York at the end of the season, he was cast for the part of the old man in Eugene O'Neill's "Desire Under the Stars." That established him as a dramatic star of the first rank.
