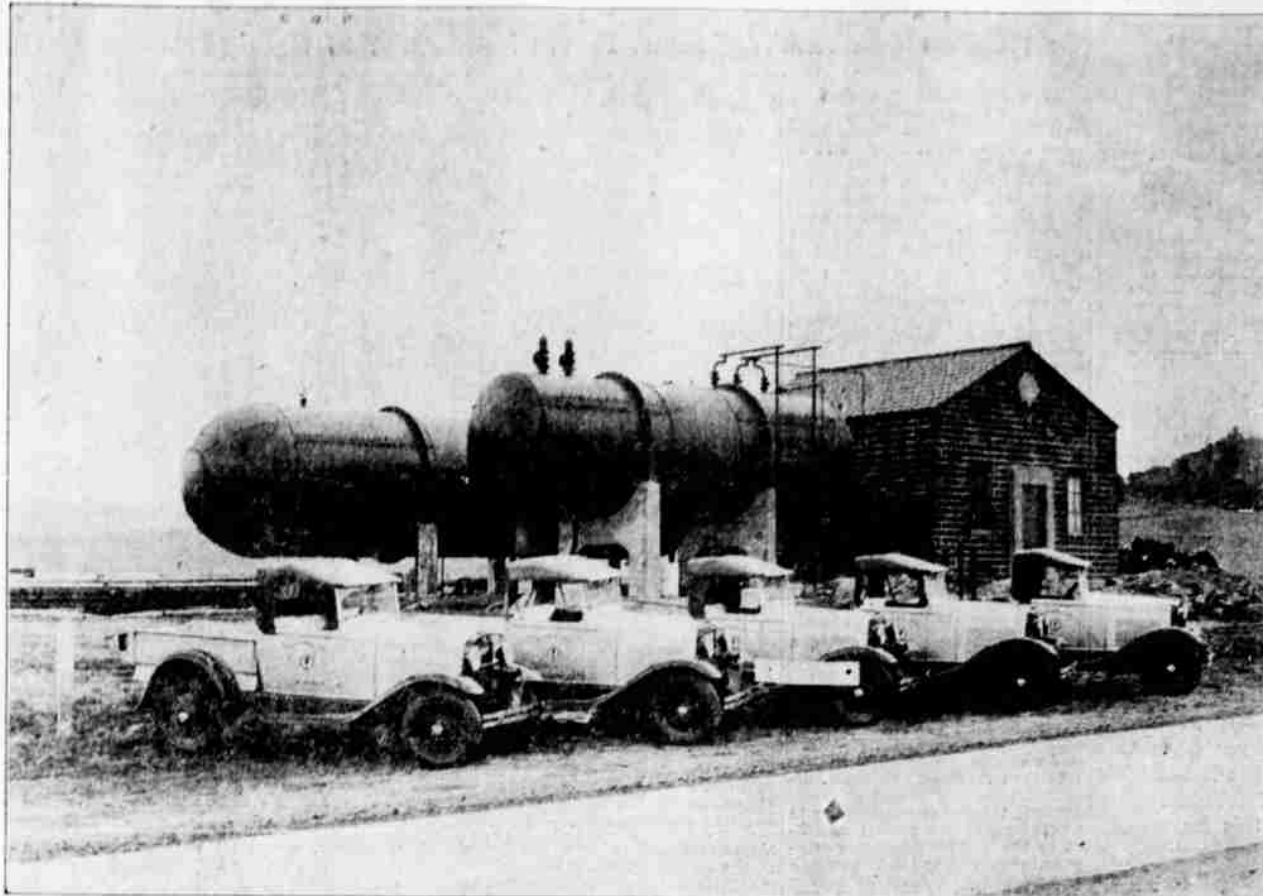
Mickey Doland, another in Salkeld's stable, meets Wildcat Carter tonight in Seattle in a main event.
