RADICALS HAVE PRESS SERVICE IN WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON, Jan. 21. (AP)—Recommendations that reports from the house press gallery of Laurence Todd, representative of the Federated Press, be carefully scrutinized, have been laid before the house in the report of the Fish communist investigating committee.

"The Federated Press, organized in 1918," the report said, aims to furnish information to the radical press of the country, including communist newspapers. Its main clients are either advanced socialist papers, radical labor units, or communist or other revolutionary papers."

Todd was recently in the news here as the one who charged E. J. Adams, attorney for the Federated Trades commission, with attempting to bring about the sale of the Eugene power plant to the "power trust." The charges, Todd said, were based on a letter alleged to have been written by E. M. Bennett, identified with the Eugene water board. Adams is a former state highway commissioner of Oregon.

Todd was later quoted as having admitted to the trade commission he had nothing to base his charges upon except the Bennett letter, and that he had no first hand information.

The Fish report said the Federated Press "maintains a substantial organization, and covers the United States, and has its connections with radical newspapers in foreign countries."

"It has received approximately \$5,000 annually from the Garland fund," the report declares.

PRaise GIVEN TO ALASKA BY DR. KELLEMS

"In no part of the world is so much beauty crammed together as there is on the Pacific coast, from San Diego to Alaska," said Dr. Jesse Kellems in his talk on "The Future of Alaska" at the forum of the chamber of commerce this noon.

Dr. Kellems, introduced by Rev. Arthur D. Eaton in a witty manner, related the adventures of the Kellems family in their recent trip to Alaska. Dr. Kellems stated that he had considered calling his address on Alaska, "Landlubbers drift," as they made the trip in a gasoline yacht from Olympia, Wash., to Skagway, Alaska, without any previous experience in navigation.

Many interesting anecdotes of the trip were related by Dr. Kellems, including the rescue of two youths, each with a wooden leg, who were adrift in a canoe in Puget Sound. Beauties of the trip to Skagway were described by the speaker in vivid terms, and interesting, intimate and humorous sidelights of the trip were included in his talk.

He spoke at length on the possibilities of future industrial development of Alaska, and predicted that before many years this territory will be one of the great wealthy states of the American commonwealth.

The remainder of the forum hour was turned over to Dr. Homer Kellems, who showed beautiful lantern slides of the Alaskan trip. The pictures were all snapped by a small kodak, and were finished by Dr. Kellems himself. An interesting feature of the picture program was a series of totem poles photographed in a cemetery in a small Canadian village.
