

# Women Hear Root Plead the Cause Of World Court

### Committee Room Crowded as Veteran Statesman Urges Adherence of United States to The Historic Protocol

WASHINGTON, Jan. 21 (AP)—A group of women today as the venerable American statesman, Elihu Root, crowded the senate foreign relations committee room urged American adherence to the world court.

Mr. Root, who will be 86 years old next month, could barely be heard above the babble of voices and confusion outside the committee room as he related his part in drafting the modified proposal for American adherence.

Sitting at the end of a long table opposite Chairman Borah, an opponent of the court, Mr. Root was not interrupted as he went into the history of the tribunal and the details of America's first proposal to enter the court with reservations five years ago.

He said there were two obstacles in the way of acceptance by other powers of the senate reservation put upon American adherence in 1922. This reservation provided that the court should not render an advisory opinion on any question in which the United States had, or claimed to have, an interest without first obtaining the consent of this government.

First, he said, "in the asking of advisory opinions of the court, the league of nations would be obliged to proceed in ignorance of the attitude of the United States. It would throw doubt and delay around all proceedings."

"Second, there was ignorance on the part of the other powers

of the council as to the meaning of the term intended in the reservation. There was ignorance as to the scope the United States would give to the term 'interest.' It might mean legal interest, it might mean political interest and so forth."

Mr. Root, a former secretary of state, recited instances of the application of such provisions in other treaties. He recalled the treaty of 1832 with Russia which he said was terminated.

"No difficulties arise any more over termination," he said. "So the senate's reservation and its acceptance very much relieved the difficulty in making the agreement."

Root then took up the negotiations for meeting the senate's objectionable reservation regarding advisory opinions. He met two years ago with other international jurists to solve the problem.

Reading the solution then worked out, as provided in the protocol now before the senate, Root said, "It does not in the

# MILLER PLANS CONSERVATION OF WILD LIFE

SALEM, Jan. 21, (AP)—After a conference yesterday with Governor Julius L. Meier, Senator K. W. Miller of Josephine county believes the governor will be sympathetic towards a program of state promotion measures that Miller hopes to introduce at this session of the legislature. Miller's program is for the purpose of placing Oregon's scenery, game and other outdoor attractions before the country in such a way that the state will get the advantage of tourist traffic that he believes its resources justify.

Before the state can go as far as it should in promotion, however, Miller declares the system of taxation must be revised, and he believes taxation is the greatest problem before the legislature. He thinks the excise and income tax acts, and the intangibles tax, if it is re-enacted, are not adequate to relieve real property taxation as they should, and Senator Miller will be one of the sponsors of a sales or consumption tax that is now being prepared.

"It is imperative," Miller said, "that adequate provision be made not only to take care of the needs of the state institutions, but to wipe out the state's deficit. Further, an adequate financial plan should provide for a surplus or reserve, built up as the years go by, to take care of emergencies."

Relative to state promotion Miller said: "There is a feeling over the slightest degree modify the senate's reservation."

He said the United States was protected at all times by another senate reservation already accepted by the other powers "which makes the agreement terminable at will."
