LENIN'S MEN FIGHT POLICE IN VANCOUVER

VANCOUVER, B. C., Jan. 22. (AP)—Eleven men were being held here today as a result of the celebration yesterday of the Lenin anniversary and a near riot last night. Several policemen and others were injured in the two clashes, one policeman barely escaped having his eyes gouged out.

Constable William Clark was struck down by a brick hurled from the afternoon crowd and was pounced upon by several demonstrators. One man was beaten severely by police after he had attempted to gouge out Clark's eyes. Police used their "billys" and members of the crowd retaliated with "loaded garden hose." Eight were arrested.

About 250 persons gathered late last night when three men were arrested, and engaged the police. Reserves were called before they beat off the crowd which attempted to prevent the men from being taken to jail.
