ALMA REUBENS, STAR, VICTIM OF PNEUMONIA

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 22. (AP)—The valiant fight of Alma Reubens to conquer narcotic addiction and make a comeback in motion pictures today is ended in death.

Miss Reubens, two years ago one of the screen's adored stars, lived a story more tragic than film-makers would attempt to depict.

She died last night peacefully of pneumonia, but the coming of death after a 60-hour coma served to remove the darkest cloud ever to shadow the black-haired actress.

Two weeks ago Miss Reubens was arrested in San Diego on federal charges of smuggling and possession of narcotics. She was taken ill with a cold, which developed into pneumonia, shortly after being released from jail under \$5,000 bond, to await hearing and trial.

When, nearly twelve years ago, Miss Reubens played the female lead in Douglas Fairbanks' "The Half-Breed," she was described as Hollywood's newest Cinderella.

Her starring roles in such pictures as "Humoresque," "The Valley of Silent Men," "Guilty But Not Guilty," "Siberia" and "Unseeing Eyes," during the next decade established her as one of the foremost.

Then in January, 1929, Miss Reubens was revealed as a narcotic addict. She dropped out of pictures and soon was confined for treatment at the Spadra state hospital. She was paroled within a few months, only again to be arrested for addiction and sent to the Patton state asylum, from which she was released as cured in December of the same year.

After her term at Spadra had been served, Miss Reubens began a comeback. She played her first talking picture, "Show Boat."

During a trip to New York, for a rest that she hoped would prepare her for re-entrance to films, Miss Reubens broke with Ricardo Cortez, film actor, her third husband. They were married in January, 1926. She said she claimed too much credit for her cure, and forwarded divorce papers for filing.

Although the suit never went to trial, the couple remained estranged. Cortez said two hours before Miss Reubens died he had not been informed that she was seriously ill.

AT THE PINE TREE

Kenneth MacKenna, featured in "Men Without Women" and other talking photoplays, was loaned to Paramount by Fox Films for the role he portrays in "The Virtuous Sin," at the Pine Tree theater now.

MacKenna plays the role of a young scientist, the husband of Kay Francis, feminine lead of the production. Walter Huston, who recently completed the role of "Abraham Lincoln," in D. W. Griffith's film of that name, carries the part of the general.

Louis Gasnier, who directed William Powell in "For the Defense," and George Cukor, dialogue director on "All Quiet on the Western Front," and co-director of "Grumpy," collaborated on this drama.

MacKenna came to the screen from the stage and was seen in several silent productions before the advent of sound. He made his stage debut in 1919 and among his best known leading roles are those in "The Big Pond," which he played for two years; "What Every Woman Knows," "Forever After," and "Windows," the last three of which he produced.

The Columbia university graduate made his screen debut in 1925 when he appeared opposite Babe Daniels in "Little Miss Bluebeard," at Paramount's New York studios. He also was opposite Esther Ralston in "The American Venus," in New York.

Since talking pictures have entered the screen world, MacKenna has been seen as the leading man in such productions as "In Love With Love," "Pleasure Crazy," "Temple Tower," and recently has been supporting Mary Pickford in "Forever After."

POSSE KILLS MURDERER OF FRESNO COP

FRESNO, Calif., Jan. 22. (AP)—A two-hour gun battle between Leo Solito, fugitive slayer of Police Officer Frank G. Campbell, and a posse of officers here early today ended in the shooting to death of Solito and the probable fatal wounding of Acting Police Lieutenant John O. Brame.

Solito, subject of a widespread hunt, was located by Brame and two other officers at the scene of the slaying of Campbell, which occurred a week ago. The three officers went to the place after receiving a tip and caught sight of Solito as he attempted to conceal himself.

Policemen Talbot and E. L. McCaskey opened fire, wounding Solito. Brame started after the fugitive, who turned, whipped out a gun and shot the acting lieutenant through the head. Solito succeeded in reaching a shed on the premises, and all available officers were summoned.

In a few minutes the shed was surrounded by more than 70 policemen, firemen and American Legionnaires. Under the glare of searchlights set up by the firemen the battle continued.

Solito and members of the posse fired at each other intermittently for about two hours before the fugitive showed any signs of weakening. Then he made a break for the open. Bullets from the embattled officers cut him down quickly.

Solito was arrested by Patrolman Campbell on the morning of January 15. The prisoner asked permission to see a friend of his in the house before going to jail. Obtaining this permission Solito dashed through the house in an attempt to escape. Campbell pursued and overtook him. In the ensuing scuffle Solito shot and fatally wounded Campbell.
