

Dry Commissioner Says Parents to Drive Out Booze

Mackintosh of Wickersham Committee Says People Immature in Criticizing Report, Which He Describes as Enlightening

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 23 (AP)—A revolt of mothers and fathers against prohibition was predicted by Kenneth Mackintosh of Seattle, member of the Wickersham commission, here today. He was among the five who recommended further trial and strict enforcement of prohibition.

"Because American fathers and mothers are appalled at seeing their boys and girls return home intoxicated night after night, a change in the present law is inevitable," he said.

"The home, whether wet or dry when the law went into effect, now demands something be done to keep the young away from the speakeasies."

"It is too easy to make alcohol. Almost anyone can afford to get up a still in his cellar. As for the taste of the stuff, there are very few left who can really discern. The new generation, certainly, cannot tell the old brands from over-night stuff. I should suppose they would be rather suspicious of the taste of the genuine product."

Enforcement of the law to the degree envisioned by its framers, he said, is impossible, Mackintosh said. He criticized those who attacked the commission's report without first studying it, and denounced the reports that President Hoover "dictated" to the commission.

"As was to be expected, passionate partisans, without having had an opportunity to examine thoroughly the long report, were quick to put their prejudiced interpretations on such of it as they were informed of, and voice their opinions and criticisms."

"Nevertheless, thinking people of the country will find the report enlightening and helpful in coming to an intelligent conclusion on this all-important subject."

The fact of the matter is that ultra-Modernism is not Christianity at all—it is a new religion. It is possible for a man to dodge sectarian religion and be just a Christian. That I think we could all be if we were willing to be guided by Christ and His word."
