

DEATH CLAIMS ANNA PAVLOVA FAMED DANCER

THE HAGUE, Jan. 23. (AP)—Death today killed forever the dainty fragile form of Anna Pavlova, whose dancing stirred millions, civilized man and savage alike. She would have been 46 years old January 31.

Pleurisy and influenza, contracted early this week after she had been held for hours by a railroad accident in a waiting train at Dijon, France, rang down the curtain upon a life which for 35 years she devoted to depicting in rhythmic movement the beauty she saw around her.

With her at the end were her husband and accompanist, Victor D'Andre, two Dutch physicians, and her own Russian doctor, Professor Valerki, who yesterday resorted to a pulmonary operation in a vain attempt to save her life.

Denounced by the Bolsheviks as the "darling of aristocrats," she died in virtual exile from the Russia in which she was born, began her ballet lessons at the age of ten, and achieved her first success in recent years.

Communist influences had led even to rejection of annual contributions of \$500 to other Russian dancers.

It was during her last visit to the United States in 1924, that she announced her marriage to D'Andre, her accompanist, later revealing that it had taken place 17 years before. Other details of her private life she kept secret, with the plea that the public regards the artist as an illusion, and she preferred to remain so.

She was received everywhere with acclaim, in the capitals of Europe, America, and in Moscow and Zulu camps of New Zealand and Africa. Probably her most famous ballet was the dance of the dying swan, in which she made her debut at the Metropolitan Opera House in New York in 1910. She was considered the world's greatest ballerina, and ranked with Elsie, Grief, and Tagliani of the early 19th century.

Church Parsonages May Be Exempted

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 23. (AP)—Church parsonages having an assessed valuation of less than \$2500 would be exempt from taxation by a bill soon to be introduced by Senator Joel C. Booth of Lincoln and Lane counties. The exemption would also extend to the land they occupy if not more than two lots in a platted town or more than one acre in an unplatted town. The bill is designed to add the smaller church organizations of the state.

Anderson Scores Two Victories In One Night

OMAHA, Neb., Jan. 23. (AP)—The right hand of Eddie Anderson, Chicago lightweight boxer, was raised twice in the same ring last night.

Anderson and Miss Babe Matthews of Omaha marched down crowded aisles in evening dress to the strains of wedding music, and were married in the ring as "tinkle" cameras ground away.

Unofficial Court Judge John Bathe, read the service, and then raised Anderson's right hand, an ancient token of victory in the squared circle.

Anderson embraced his bride, and she bestowed a kiss upon embarrassed Billy Vaughn of Omaha, Anderson's opponent.

Anderson's opponent, the semi-windup Harry The Bridegroom, then stripped down to his fighting togs and punched out an eight-round victory.

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Harlan Unable To Appear Here

W. G. Harlan of the state chamber of commerce who was scheduled to speak before the stockholders of the Klamath County Dairymen's association at a meeting in this city Saturday will be unable to be present, according to word received Thursday.

The illness of W. G. Ide, manager of the Oregon state chamber of commerce, makes Harlan's presence necessary in Portland. Harlan is assistant manager of the Oregon state chamber of commerce and editor of the Oregon Business magazine.

Jack Dempsey Has An Injured Finger

NEW YORK, Jan. 23. (AP)—As mail cut on the fourth finger of his left hand has forced Jack Dempsey into the Polytechnic hospital here for treatment.

Dempsey disregarded the cut as of no consequence but an infection set in, swelling the hand to twice its normal size. Dr. Frank Brennan said the former heavyweight champion probably would be able to leave the hospital in a day or two.

Fire Threatens Beloved Home of Teddy Roosevelt

OYSTER BAY, N. Y., Jan. 23. (AP)—Theodore Roosevelt's beloved Sagamore Hill home was threatened by fire last night.

From one of those fireplaces of which he wrote "in them the logs roar and crackle during the long winter evenings"—sparks ignited the roof and started a small blaze. Mrs. Roosevelt was notified by an employee and telephoned an alarm.

Fire companies extinguished the flames with chemicals in a few minutes. The damage unofficially was estimated at \$1,000.

It was at Sagamore Hill that the former president spent the happiest hours of his life, there with the leaders of his time and finally dying at the end of an illustrious career.

Interesting Pictures Are On Display

Insurance Men Are Opposing Pension

SALEM, Jan. 23. (AP)—A delegation of 15 insurance men from Portland were here yesterday to oppose the bill to provide a pension fund for Portland policemen and firemen. The bill has not been introduced but is being considered by the Multnomah delegation. It is proposed that \$200,000 from funds collected by the State Insurance com-

missioner in taxes on insurance premiums paid in Portland be diverted to the pension fund. Other sources of the fund are a millage tax in Portland and a 2 1/2 per cent contribution by policemen and firemen from their salaries.
