DEATH PENALTY IS GIVEN WOMAN

SAN ANTONIO, Tex., Jan. 24. (AP)—Mrs. Clara Ehr, 49, was given the death penalty for the murder of her husband, Daniel Henry Ehr, by a jury here today. Ehr was slain with an axe while he slept in his home. Lexie Jones, a Port San Houston soldier, testified he saw Ehr on the promise of Mrs. Ehr to pay him \$500.

If the judgment of the court is carried out, Mrs. Ehr will be the first woman ever executed in the history of Texas.

Jones is under indictment for Ehr's murder, and another soldier, Donald Walker, also implicated in the slaying, was tried and given 15 years imprisonment. Ehr had been bed-ridden since he suffered a stroke of paralysis a number of years ago.

Jones testified that Mrs. Ehr left an axe at the rear entrance of her home for use in committing the murder. He said that when he entered the room where Ehr was sleeping, Mrs. Ehr, in an adjoining bed, turned her face to the wall while he delivered the fatal blow.

RECORD CROWD IS EXPECTED AT SERVICES

But we have learned that anything that is good and beautiful may be used today for the praise and honor of God."

Another great crowd assembled last night to hear Dr. Kellems message. It is because of such interest that it has been decided to continue the meetings another week.
