

Briton Liberates Gandhi, Leader of Seething Indians

Clad Only in Usual Loin Cloth and Shawl, Frail Indian Leader Appears Thin and Worn; Many Await Glimpse of Him

POONA, India, Jan. 26 (AP)—Mahatma Gandhi, frail 61-year-old leader of the Indian Nationalists, was released from prison shortly after 11 o'clock tonight.

They took him out the back way secretly, bundled him into a closed automobile with drawn curtains and drove to a small railway station about ten miles from Poona, where the authorities put him on a train for Bombay. He was due there at 5:30 tomorrow morning.

Thin and Worn

The little old man wore only his usual homespun loin cloth and a thin cotton shawl over his shoulders. He was thin and worn.

With him on the train was the woman nationalist, Mrs. Sarojini Naidu, India's leading poetess, who toured America in 1929.

None but a few persons, including the Associated Press correspondent, knew in advance the exact hour at which this midnight "flight" would take place. The authorities had maintained the closest secrecy regarding Gandhi's release as a precaution against demonstrations by his followers.

Leads Teeming Millions

All day and all night crowds in which there were many women waited outside the jail hoping for a fleeting glimpse of the man who would lead India's 320,000,000 out of the shadow of British rule and into the full light of freedom. They were disappointed.

Gandhi's last act before leaving the prison where he has lived since last May was to hand Major J. R. Martin, the superintendent, a written statement in which, it was understood, he thanked him for his considerate treatment.

Prisoner Well Treated

This gesture was not unexpected, for since the beginning of his incarceration Gandhi had occupied several large rooms opening on the courtyard garden.

For the five-hour ride by train to Bombay he and Mrs. Naidu were given ordinary passenger quarters on a regular train and allowed four Hindi attendants.

Plans for Future

The Associated Press correspondent was one of a small group permitted to travel with the Mahatma.

Gandhi chatted pleasantly about his life in the prison and his plans for the future. He was particularly interested to know what America thought of him and how the American people regarded Ramsay MacDonald's declaration of Indian policy.

Woman Whose Death Occurred Here Was Formerly Actress

Betty Lee Fullam, who died in Klamath Falls Saturday after a brief illness, was a former vaudeville actress and played on the stage in Harry Poole's theatres here a number of years ago. For the past year she had made her home in Klamath Falls.

Harry Poole said that Mrs. Fullam played here under the name of Betty Lee and was with the "Van and Lee" dance-comedy team.

Remains are being cared for at the Earl Whitlock funeral home. Announcement of funeral arrangements will be made soon.

Clara Is Sympathetic Toward Miss DeBoe

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 26, (AP)—Clara Bow said today that she has sent a letter to Judge William Doran with a request that he read it before sentencing Daisy DeBoe, former secretary to the actress, who was convicted of stealing \$325 from her. Miss Bow said she could not reveal the contents of the letter. Miss DeBoe will be sentenced at 10 a. m.

Miss Bow's announcement was in reply to reports that she would appear in the courtroom to plead for leniency for Miss DeBoe.

Mrs. Claudine Brock, housekeeper for the actress, said Miss Bow would not go to court because "she is still sick from a cold, although she is feeling better."

When the verdict of guilty was returned against Miss DeBoe last Friday, the actress expressed sorrow for her and said she hoped "the judge will be lenient."

The letter was received by District Attorney Byron Fitts this morning. It read:

"My Dear Mr. Fitts: I am not sure to whom this letter should be addressed, or whether it is even proper under the circumstances to even write it, but I find myself unable to avoid letting you know that it is my hope that mercy will be shown to Daisy DeBoe.

"The fact is that I never would have called this matter to your attention in the first place if Daisy DeBoe had not threatened to blackmail me and I had no other way to protect myself except to come to your office and follow your advice.

"If it is right for you to do so, I wish you would tell the judge about this letter.

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 26 (AP)—Sentencing of Daisy DeBoe for the alleged theft of \$325 from Clara Bow was postponed today until next Monday by Judge William Doran when defense counsel made a motion for a new trial and asked a delay to permit preparation of arguments.

Miss DeBoe, looking tired and depressed, was in the court room in custody of a jail matron. After the brief court session was over, she was taken back to her cell, unable to obtain bail until some action has been taken on her sentence. She faces a prison term of 1 to 10 years or the court may grant her probation.

MRS. HOWARD STILL CENTER BOWLES CASE

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 26, (AP)—Search for the man who attacked Mrs. H. W. Howard, state witness in the murder case against Nelson C. Bowles and Irma Loucks, continued today although detectives said they feared he may have fled the state.

They declare they know the identity of the man who assaulted Mrs. Howard on Jan. 15, and have traced his movements for the past week. Police said the suspect has a criminal record and has been identified by Mrs. Howard from a photograph.

The Portland Telegram said today it had learned "a fund of evidence in support of their theory that Mrs. Howard, so-called 'star witness' for the state in the Bowles murder case, was not attacked and threatened because of her knowledge of the case, has been gathered by defense attorneys."

"The evidence has to do with past activities of Mrs. Howard," the paper said, "and in addition to its asserted hearing on the stories of the alleged attacks, is used by the defense in an effort to discredit any testimony given by the witness if she is called for the trial."

The article said defense attorneys have indicated that should the state reconsider and neglect to call Mrs. Howard, they will demand her appearance.
