EX-GOVERNOR AND SENATOR IS SUICIDE

JERSEY CITY, N. J., Jan. 26, (AP)—Edward L. Edwards, former governor of New Jersey and former United States senator, died today from a self-inflicted bullet wound.

He shot himself last night while alone in his bedroom at his Kensington Avenue home. His son, Irving Edwards, said he had been suffering from ill health and despondency several months.

Until a few years ago Edwards was a power in both politics and finance in New Jersey. In 1920 his assertion that he would make New Jersey "as well as the Atlantic ocean" caused him to be mentioned as an anti-prohibition hope for the presidential nomination. But in 1928 he was defeated for reelection to the United States senate and later he had a falling out with Mayor Frank Hague of Jersey City, democratic leader of the state, that ended his political prominence.

His financial position suffered because of the troubles of the New Jersey Securities company, of which he was president. The organization, which owned several banks in northern New Jersey, went into receivership in 1929 and its chief stockholder, Harry H. Weinberger, subsequently was indicted on charges of fraud.

Edwards' body was not discovered until today, after he had died. Charles J. Baumgarten, an old friend and legal adviser, had called to confer with him. Baumgarten thought it strange when a servant told him Edwards still was in bed and with Walter Westfall, a neighbor, he went to the bedroom.

Gen. Wood Inspects Sites At Roseburg

ROSEBURG, Ore., Jan. 26, (AP)—General George H. Wood, chairman of the board of managers of National Soldiers' homes, was on his way to San Francisco today after completing inspection of nearly sixty sites offered by the Pacific northwest for a \$2,000,000 soldiers' home authorized by congress.

General Wood made the last stop of the tour here, yesterday and inspected two tracts offered by Roseburg. He said the sites are well adapted for all requirements but declined to comment on possible action of the committee.

MOTIVE FOUND FOR FIGHT IN NEW YORK CLUB

NEW YORK, Jan. 26, (AP)—The wrecking of the club Abbey and the shooting of one or more Broadway racketeers early Saturday morning was attributed today to a quarrel between two women.

In reconstructing the events, police said they believed Arthur "Dutch" Schultz, Bronx beer baron, was wounded along with "Chink" Sherman who is in Poly-clinic hospital with painful gun and knife wounds. Schultz and his chief aide, known as "Marty the Wolf", are the subjects of a search.

Schultz, his two bodyguards

and two women were spotted near Sherman's party, which included three women. During the course of the entertainment, a woman from Schultz's table and out from Sherman's table started an altercation, one of them using a table knife to defend herself.

The men joined in the argument and soon revolvers and knives were flashing. The lights were shot out. Schultz was whisked away in a taxicab by his two confederates. It was wounded at least once in the shoulder and possibly seriously.

Schultz is reputed to be a collection agent for "Big Bill" Dwyer in his Harlem beer racket. He was said to have a large sum of money for Dwyer at the time of the shooting. One of Dwyer's aides waited outside the club until long after the fracas.
