

Great Multitudes Greet Handhi upon Arrival at Bombay

Strange Leader Receives Acclamation Such as Few Have Known. Asks Crowds to Go. Urges Liberation of Prisoners.

BOMBAY, India, Jan. 27 (AP)—Mahatma Gandhi, released last night from a British prison at Poona, today urged the authorities to liberate the thousands of Indian nationalists still in jail, emphasizing the necessity for general political amnesty if peace is to be restored in India.

Tumultuous multitudes surrounded Gandhi upon his arrival from Yeroda prison today and gave him one of the greatest ovations of his strange career.

Only after hours of cheering and acclamation such as few men have known could he break away, pleading with them.

"If you love me, go home. Go home and spin yarn and bring it to me. This is the greatest service that you can render India and myself. I am weary and tired after my sleepless night on the train and if you are merciful you will disperse."

Women then garlanded him with flowers and entwined his neck with thousands of yards of this homespun yarn which looked like American ticker tape. Outside the house where he will stay the crowds, whose emotions had reached the heights of religious ecstasy, prostrated themselves before the mystical leader in adoration, and worshipped him as if he were a God.

Gandhi raised his hands above his head and clasped them as if in benediction while some of his disciples took his frail 56-pound body on their shoulders and carried him into the house. In response to repeated ovations he was forced again and again to show himself, at each appearance begging the multitude to disperse.

Leaving the prison at Poona last night Gandhi told prison officials that he would be back within two months. On the train from Chinchwad, to Bombay, passengers shouted "long live Gandhi our King."

When he got home the Finns were at war with Soviet Russia and Lundborg became a hero in the Finnish tank corps. In one engagement he fought off a detachment of Russian infantry singlehanded after two companions in his tank had been killed. He won the White Rose of Finland for that and at the end of the war he was a colonel.

A few years later he was fighting with the Latvians against the Soviets and after that he went home to join the Swedish air force.

He is one of the foremost fliers in Sweden, but outside his own country he was little known before his rescue of General Norrman. After that exploit he visited the United States and was received at the White House.

MEDFORD, Ore., Jan. 27. (AP)—James E. Kingsley, 24, alias J. C. Adams, who, police say, has signed a written confession admitting he killed Sam Prescott, Ashland traffic officer last Saturday, today waived preliminary hearings and was bound over to the grand jury on a first degree murder charge. He is held without bond.

The grand jury will be called tomorrow to consider the case.

Earl Remington, 19, of Wentches, Wash., a chance companion of the slayer, is held as a material witness with bail set at \$10,000.

TELLS OF PLAN TO GET LOWER FREIGHT RATES

Arthur M. Geary, attorney for the Northwestern Livestock Shippers' League, North Pacific Grain Growers Association, and other general farm organizations of Oregon, Washington and Idaho, all of which are engaged in important freight rate litigation, returned to his home in Portland Monday after a business visit in Klamath county.

According to Mr. Geary, the new grain rates with heavy reductions to Klamath county shippers will become effective April first, unless the rail carriers decide to appeal to higher courts.

"Final decision," added Mr. Geary, "in the general investigation of livestock rates is now a year past due and may be expected soon. With reasonable through rates, and lower rates upon feeders and stockers, the Klamath Basin should become one of the greatest livestock feeding areas in the United States. We are hoping for help from the commission along these lines."

"The rate attack of big packers with extensive plants in the middle west, upon stock producers and independent packers of the Pacific coast will be resisted to the nth degree. Cuts sought in rates upon packing house products from the corn belt would tend toward monopoly," the prominent attorney continued, "and Chicago, meat packing headquarters, would dictate prices paid for dressed meat and packing house products by the consumer."

"Dates and places for rate hearings have not yet been set," Mr. Geary concluded. On Saturday the Portland attorney attended the irrigation rights conference called in this city by State Engineer Charles E. Strickland, and also a meeting of the supervisors of the Lake-shore Gardens Drainage District of which he is a member.

CHICAGO GANG MAKES HAUL AS BULLETS SING

CHICAGO, Jan. 27 (AP)—Five men were held by the police today in connection with a hold robbery yesterday of \$19,200 by five gunmen at the Weibelt department store, Lincoln and Ashland avenue. The money was seized during an exchange of shots which caused scores of customers to flee in fear. Three men were wounded.

The money was being transferred from the store to a bank. The robbers, posted in the store, closed in on two policemen and two bank guards as they neared a first floor exit. Three robbers came up out the basement stairs; a fourth appeared in the doorway and the fifth was standing at a counter to the rear.

At the command to "stick 'em up" the fight started. Amid the roar of firearms and the screams of women customers one of the robbers seized a box containing the money. William Blinder, lying wounded on the floor, fired at the fleeing robbers. One of them staggered and cried out in pain, but was dragged into the robbers' automobile by a companion.
