MURDER TRIAL IS ON AT VANCOUVER

VANCOUVER, Wash., Jan. 28. (AP)—With the defense contending Andrew Hendrickson died from a diseased heart and hemorrhage of the brain, instead of from a skull fracture, the second day of the murder trial of Walno H. Miki opened today. He is charged with having beaten Hendrickson to death in a fight last Nov. 24. Dr. Leslie L. Nunn who performed the autopsy, said there was no indication of skull fracture.

Meade Opposed to Local Canal Roof

Suggestions for the beautification of the irrigation canal which winds for three and one half miles through the city of Klamath Falls, establishing a pleasing outlook of shrubbery and parkways, in lieu of junk and dead cats, are made by Dr. Elwood Mead, commissioner of reclamation, in a lengthy letter to Senator Thomas of Idaho, chairman of the irrigation committee.

The transformation plan, all at the expense of Klamath Falls, is brought forth by Dr. Mead because of Senator Steiwer's bill providing that the government put the canal underground by construction of a tunnel, and thereby allay the complaints of citizens that the open canal is dangerous, unsightly and unsanitary.

Says Problem Local

Dr. Mead does not take kindly to Steiwer's idea. Klamath Falls and not the government should pay, he argues, because Klamath Falls has caused most of the trouble by spreading out. In 1905, when the reclamation service built the canal, it ran only half a mile through the town, and the place had only 1000 people. Canal problems are local, he avers, and should be solved at the expense of the community. He estimates the cost of a tunnel at \$375,000, as against the \$200,000 proposed to be authorized by the Steiwer bill.

The canal would be a joy to the people, summer and winter, as envisioned by Dr. Mead. His description suggests the charms of Venice, lacking only the gondolas and the music.

"In a desert country," he remarks, "the presence of flowing water is always pleasing."

In winter, he adds, it would be possible to have two miles of skating in the heart of the city, by slowing up the water where it is inclined to race under the bridges.

He concedes that the view is not always alluring as it is, for at times when the water is out there may be seen "auto casings, pieces of junk and occasionally a dead cat or dog." This, he remarks, is merely because of improper use. At moderate expense the junk may be removed.

GRAIN SUPPLY IS IN CONTROL OF FARM BOARD

TOLEDO, O., Jan. 28. (AP)—Harold Anderson, president and general manager of the National Milling company, said today that the virtual corner of domestic wheat supplies in the hands of federal farm board agencies on the Chicago board of trade, has forced his company to revolutionize its buying and pricing policies. Starting immediately, Mr. Anderson said, the National Mill, largest soft wheat consumer in the world, will clean up all privately owned grain in its storage tanks as well as its hedges in the Chicago market. This accomplished, he said the mill will depend on the farm board for wheat supplies and base flour prices on farm board wheat prices until the new 1931 crop is available in July or August.

Sources other than the farm board agencies very shortly will have but negligible amounts of wheat available for milling, Mr. Anderson believed. He said millers generally had little choice other than to depend on the farm board for supplies. Hedging facilities, he said, are temporarily ruined and flour prices through necessity would have to be based on governmental wheat prices.
