

Thirty-Six Rounds on Tonight's Boxing Card

TWO 10-ROUND EVENTS WILL BE FEATURES

The canvas has been swept, the ropes adjusted, water buckets disinfected and polished, and Bobby Ross, the new referee, is all primed, and the several fighters are here and in trim for the first boxing card to be staged under the direction of the boxing commission's new matchmaker, Frank Miles, at the Legion Arena tonight.

Thirty-six rounds of milling, consisting of two 10-round main events, and four four-round bouts will be offered the fans on the initial night of the new boxing administration.

O'Dell Meets Aubertin
Tony O'Dell and Paul Aubertin will headline the bill and fans are expecting a lively bout between the former, a local favorite, and Aubertin, a French fighter who arrived in this country only a short time ago with Pierre Pothier, the lightweight.

There is no doubt about both boys being in the pink of condition for tonight's engagement. The O'Dell boy is always in fighting trim. He takes his training seriously and is counting no chances of being counted a loser to the Frenchman. Aubertin has been in training with Pothier and others of his stablemates at Ashland, and word has been received that he keeps in a condition as excellent as that which Pothier enjoys.

Jackson vs. Francis
"Steamboat" Jackson, who was a top-notch here until he lapsed into poor fighting trim and lost much of his popularity, meets Art Francis in the second 10-round main event of the evening.

Jackson appeared on the last card staged in this city and pleased the fans with his improved fighting condition. It is said that he has continued his training and conditioning, in which event he will exhibit the form which once made him a favorite in this section. Francis is unknown to local fans, but has engaged in many encounters and knows every department of the game.

Four-Round Bouts
Al Young and Chuck Cross will open the evening's fight encounter in a four-round curtain raiser. They will weigh in at 125 pounds.

Pat McFadden and Chuck Martin, who are in the 150-pound class, will step four rounds.

Jack Kirk and Jack Davies, both good and willing mixers, will engage in a four-round encounter which will give the fans plenty of action. Kirk and Davies are both finished boxers.

Jack Crim and Josh Blackwell, who tip the scales at 165 pounds each, will provide the fourth of the four-round events.

Officials to Attend
All the participants are local boys with the exception of Aubertin, the Frenchman and Crim, and the latter hails from Chiloquin, as does Jack Davies.

Tonight's card will open at the usual hour of 8:15 and will be attended by Mayor Fred Cofer and a majority of the city officials who are anxious to make the initial card of the new administration an unqualified success.

CHAMPIONS OF SIGN BOARDS GET HEARING

SALEM, Jan. 28 (AP)—Opposition to the senate bill which would prohibit the placing of sign boards within a thousand feet of any highway in the state, and at curves and crossings, was voiced here last night by out-of-doors advertising firms in public hearing before the roads and highways committee.

The bill, introduced by Senator R. W. Johnson and Representative Ralph Hamilton, was designed, the authors state, with a view to aesthetic advantages but primarily as a safety measure to eliminate traffic fatalities. It was on these two points that opponents, and proponents discussed the bill.

H. Paul Deuber, representing Foster & Kleiser, advertisers, led the opposition, declaring that if the bill were passed it would mean the putting out of business organized advertising firms. He stated his company did not oppose safety precautions nor preservation of natural beauty, but that the bill went further and prohibited legitimate business. He stated that advertising firms were responsible for only 5 per cent of the signs along highways, and that there did not pose hazardous points were not hazardous to traffic.

C. P. Bishop, Salem, one of the owners of the Pendleton Woolen Mills; Attorney John Logan, of Portland; L. A. McNary, Portland; Will E. Gibson, of Portland, representing advertising firms, and Ben Santell, of Albany, appeared against the bill.

J. Devers, attorney for the state highway commission; Senator Johnson and Representative Hamilton, presented state, county and city officials' arguments to show increasing fatalities, many of which they said were due to diversion of the drivers by signs along state highways, and that this measure was designed to eliminate. Legislation of other states were cited as progress made in clearing up highways and reducing highway accidents.

Wreck of Grocery Truck Is Cause of A Lively Scramble

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 28 (AP)—A crowd of unemployed persons scrambled for food scattered along the Pennsylvania Railroad here today when a train smashed a chain store truck, injuring two men seriously.

Police had a busy time patrolling 150 yards of track along which the truck's cargo of groceries was scattered. They estimated that 300 persons were trying to get food.

Billiard Champ Loses Tough Game To Former Pupil

CHICAGO, Jan. 28 (AP)—Johnny Layton's three-year-old reign over the three cushion billiard world has been ended by his own pupil.

Allen Hall of Chicago, who learned the fine arts of the difficult game from Layton in a St. Louis pool room years ago, last night defeated the champion, 50 to 43 in a great up and down match that lasted 40 innings.

The defeat definitely shoved Layton out of the championship tussle. Hall, the "baby" of the tournament, will meet another Chicagoan, Arthur Thurnblad, in a match for the title tomorrow night.

Each has captured five out of six matches. Thurnblad, who accepted his only defeat of the tournament so far from Layton by one point, gained the championship finals yesterday by defeating Otto Reist of Philadelphia.

SCHMELING IS BACK PLANNING TO DO BATTLE

NEW YORK, Jan. 28 (AP)—His broad face beaming, black eyes shining with pleasure, Max Schmeling moved into New York today, genuinely happy to be back in the land that voted him heavyweight champion of the world.

In Fine Condition
The youthful German with the features of a young Jack Dempsey sailed into Brooklyn late last night on the liner Europa, accompanied by his trainer, Max Machon, a dozen pieces of baggage and a cute little dachshund named Cecile, third in the line of teuton dogdom aristocracy that is rapidly becoming the favorite pet of the New York box fight writers fraternity.

Max appeared to be in splendid physical condition, eager to get to work on preparations for his title battle in June with young Bill Stribling, Georgia's challenger for the heavyweight championship. He was anxious to explain that, regardless of statements in the papers, he has never made derogatory remarks regarding either the New York state athletic commission which recently stripped him of his title, or the German boxing federation with which he has been tilting. Over and over again he insisted that he wants to fight Jack Sharkey, feels sure that eventually he will face the Boston sailor in a prize-ring, but for the present:

It's Up to "Yackobs"
"Cho Yackobs has mine manager. I am der fighter. He manages. I fights. Was he says, goes."

Sharkey has no one to blame but himself, Max insisted, for the muddled state of affairs that enveloped the heavyweights today, a situation wherein Sharkey, loser on a foul to Schmeling here last June, is recognized in New York state as the outstanding challenger while the National Boxing association, controlling boxing in 27 states, believes that Stribling alone is entitled to a title shot.

Sharkey an "Idler"
"While Stribling knocks out Phil Scott and Otto Von Porat since last I am here," Schmeling argued. "What has Sharkey done? Nothing. Sharkey should have fought as Stribling did. I cannot ignore Stribling's record. If I don't fight him the N. B. A. suspends me. If I don't fight Sharkey New York suspends me."

"Someday I will fight Sharkey again and I will whip him. I know that I would have beat him last June if he did not foul me in the fourth round. I am not entirely recovered from that punch until last October. In the third round I take all he has and they could not even give me smelling salts after the bell. In the fourth I run out. Sharkey sees me coming. He is a changed man. I feel him weaken. He fouls me."

"Ach, what can I do. I know that if I had fouled Sharkey instead of him fouling me I would not be given another chance at him."

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Easter Hero Wins Trial Steeplechase

SANDOWN, England, Jan. 28 (AP)—J. H. Whitney's grand national candidate, Easter Hero, had another outing today in preparation for the major race and galloped to an eight length victory in the mole handicap steeplechase over a course of two and half miles and 75 yards.

Mrs. Hollin's Blaris was second and Martin Smith's Guiding Light third.

Easter Hero again was a short priced favorite, paying four for five. Blaris was 11 to 8 and Guiding Light 20 to 1.

The race was worth 200 sterling (£1,000) to Whitney.

BASKETBALL PLAYS AND PLAYERS

Basketball Coach, Indiana U.
Wesley Fesler, three times All-America end, has become one of Ohio State's immortals. This year was undoubtedly his greatest in football. His versatility and value to the team easily won him the Chicago Tribune trophy given each year to the most valuable player in the Big Ten Conference.

Fesler's recognition is not confined to football, since he has been chosen as All-Conference guard on several mythical basketball teams. He further shows his all-around ability by starring in baseball either in the outfield or infield.

The key man of the Ohio State defense is Fesler. He has mastered defensive fundamentals which makes him a fine individual guard. Besides defensive technique he possesses the ability to diagnose offensive plays and to direct his teammates to meet them.

Many basketball critics declare Fesler is the best defensive man in the conference. He smears many well executed offensive plays under the basket because of his keen timing ability.

His best play is that of guarding a man in the act of shooting. The play usually ends with Fesler batting the ball as it leaves the shooter's hands and doing so without committing a foul. This requires perfect timing.

Wet And Dry Issue Is Up at Olympia

OLYMPIA, Wash., Jan. 28 (AP)—A bill amending the state bone dry law to permit manufacture and sale of eight per cent wine and four per cent beer was filed in the house today, marking the first evidence of moist sentiment in the lower branch of the state legislature.

The measure would be referred to the voters at the next general election for final action. It was introduced by Representative William J. Crookill, King county.

OREGON STATE BEATS HUSKIES

CORVALLIS, Ore., Jan. 28 (AP)—With Rod Ballard, blond forward leading the attack with seven field goals and a free throw for 15 points, and his teammates full of fire, Oregon State stopped the University of Washington quintet here last night 37 to 23 to administer the first defeat of the season to the Huskies. Only twice in the first half were the Huskies leading by slight margins. At the half the Staters led 16 to 11 and thereafter were never headed.

Entering the second half with this lead, the Beavers, led by Fagans, Ballard and Grayson, ran the score up to 27 while the Huskies collected but one basket. Coach Edmundson rushed Gritsch, Nelson and Perry into the fray in an attempt to stem the tide, but they were powerless. The Staters were not to be denied.

Swanson, husky scoring ace, was held to three field goals for the game.

Ed Lewis, star sophomore center for the Beavers was out of the game with injuries.

Oregon State plays Oregon here Saturday night.

KENNEDY WINS OVER DYNAMITE JACKSON

LOS ANGELES, Calif., Jan. 28 (AP)—In a furious ten round set to here last night, Les Kennedy, Long Beach longshoreman, took a decision over Dynamite Jackson, coach heavyweight of Los Angeles, winning six rounds, while two were called even.
