FARMERS NOT FAVORABLE TO MERGER PLAN

SALEM, Jan. 29, (AP)—Any demand for creation of a state department of agriculture at this time is not coming from farming interests of the state, the Oregon cooperative council voted at the close of its annual meeting yesterday. The group will oppose actively passage of the bill for such a department as recently introduced.

Discussion of this bill occupied most of the final executive session of the body, with every member asked to express idea on proposal. Earlier in day Representative Hector McPherson, father of the plan had explained the provisions and purposes to the council.

Several farmer members said the plan as now proposed would set up a political machine which would likely become more expensive rather than less expensive to taxpayers. Others held that farming conditions are too unsettled now to make such sweeping changes even if justified later. Some declared that the measure was proposed too hastily for producers to become familiar with its provisions in time for this session to act on it.

Reiterating its past position, the council composed of 31 farmers organizations in state, urged expansion of marketing information and statistical data on economic outlook in agriculture. The state board of higher education will be asked to provide such expansion.

Action on the bill for compulsory cream grading in Oregon was referred to the state convention of Oregon Buttermakers Association on the ground that too few dairy members of the council will be present to pass on the proposal intelligently. C. W. Laughlin of Astoria was appointed to represent the council at the buttermakers meeting in Corvallis.

Will Dedicate New Science Church In This City Sunday

The First Church of Christ, Scientist, of Klamath Falls, which is located at Tenth and Washington, will be dedicated next Sunday, February 1, during the regular Sunday morning service.

The church building was commenced during December 1926 and was occupied for the first time February 18, 1927. On December 30, 1929, the last financial obligation was met and the church declared free from debt.

The dedication service is being held in accordance with the custom of Christian Science churches which are never dedicated until fully paid for.

Ashland has already won one game and lost none while Klamath Falls broke even by winning one and losing one of the conference games. Medford has won two and lost none, and Grants Pass has suffered two defeats.

The Klamath high Wildcats will play their fourth game of the year Friday at 7:30 in the school gym, meeting the Merrill high basketball squad for the second time this season.

Endowment Plan For Football Is Opposed at Yale

NEW YORK, Jan. 29, (AP)—That gate receipts, large or small, are quite all right for college football so long as they are properly administered, is an opinion expressed by President James Rowland Angell of Yale. Yale does not expect to ask her alumni to endow athletics, President Angell told the representatives attending the annual meeting of the Yale Alumni university fund association last night.

"Intercollegiate games," he said, "should be carried on within the bounds of such reasonable expenditures as can be provided by the participant, or by special gifts, or by sales of tickets to witness the contests. Despite abuses which have grown up in some institutions, as the result of the huge gate receipts for football, these abuses are being rapidly corrected."
