Revised List Shows 28 Men Were Killed in Mine Explosion

WHITEHAVEN, Cumberland, Eng., Jan. 30. (AP)—Twenty-eight coal miners are known to have been killed in an explosion which buried them in the deep Haig pit here yesterday. The total was computed by mine officials who issued a casualty list at noon. Sixteen bodies had been recovered at that hour. All the others had been located and were being brought out as quickly as possible.

Twenty-five miners were brought out alive. Twelve of them are in serious condition in a hospital. The mine owners said a number of men caught on the fringe of the explosion turned back into the gas-filled passages and rescued some of the injured. But for them the death toll would have been higher.

The cause of the accident has not been determined.
