

COMMITTEE OF WATER USERS WILL REPORT

Preliminary reports of the committee appointed by State Engineer Charles E. Stricklin at a meeting of water users, land owners and attorneys, held on January 24, will be heard at a public meeting Saturday morning at 10 o'clock in the county court room of the county.

The committee was appointed to draft tentative legislation for proposal to the present session of the legislature regarding water rights, priority, and allocation of water over and above needs of irrigation on the Klamath and Rogue river watersheds.

The matter to be determined is the status of water rights given by the state since 1905, when waters of the Klamath and Rogue river watersheds were turned over to the federal government by the state. This proposed legislation will affect waters which the government might release again to the state, above irrigation needs, and will set forth the actual needs of irrigation. The committee also determined whether or not water rights let by the state since it lost jurisdiction to the government in 1905, will be given priority, or whether entirely new filings will have to be made.

The committee, appointed by the state engineer, is composed of the following men: Porter J. Neff, president of the board of directors of the Medford Irrigation district; E. M. Hammond, president of the board of directors of the Klamath Irrigation district; H. E. Hayden, superintendent of the Klamath project of the United States Reclamation service; C. A. Dunn, president of the board of directors of the Willow Valley Irrigation district; O. L. Brown, land owner of Upper Klamath lake; J. H. Carahan and Claude McCallach, local attorneys.

State Engineer Stricklin will not be present at tomorrow's meeting, according to an announcement received here today.

Wapinitia Cut-Off Has Been Open to Travel All Winter

Hood Loop road, shortening the route 25 from Klamath Falls to Portland, has been kept open for travel for the first time this winter, and has been used by many tourists. In spite of winter snow, the road has been closed only twice, November 15, for a few hours, and one night, January 25.

According to the state highway reports, travelers are advised to use chains.
