

RECOVER BODY OF CASE, DEAD AIRMAIL PILOT

YANCOUVER, Wash., Jan. 30. (AP)—Death came instantaneously to Walter E. Case, pilot of a mail plane, when his plane crashed into Bluff mountain, near Washougal, eight days ago. An examination revealed that practically all the larger bones in his body were shattered, indicating his ship struck the base of the mountain with tremendous force.

The body, however, was not mutilated. There was a severe bruise on the forehead where he had struck the instrument board, and physicians said this blow alone probably would have caused death.

The party which removed the body from the plane reached here this morning. The body was to be taken to Portland during the day.

PORTLAND, Jan. 30. (AP)—Carrying the body of Walter E. Case, Varney air lines pilot who was killed in a plane crash on Bluff mountain, near Washougal, Wash., eight days ago, a party of forest rangers and company officials reached Portland today. They had marched with a pack train all night long after reaching the wreck late yesterday.

A postal inspector recovered the 250 pounds of mail carried by the plane.

Leon Cuddeback, vice president of the Varney company, said it was apparent Case had flown the plane head-on into the mountain in the dense fog which obscured the course. He was found in the cockpit. Injuries indicated he had been killed when the instrument board.

Company officials found the plane badly wrecked. They burned it.

Case disappeared Jan. 22, while flying the Portland-Pasco mail. The plane's clock showed the crash occurred at 7:07 a. m., disproving the many reports the plane had been seen and heard in eastern Washington. It has been established that Case left Portland at 6:30 a. m., and upon reaching Camas, messaged he was turning back due to heavy fog. This was at 6:54 a. m.

His next report was at 7:04 a. m., when he said he was in the vicinity of Portland and was flying over a fog bank.

A strong wind from the south was driving him northward and he flew into the mountain three minutes later in the belief he was flying over the valley country near Portland.

John Schmor, employed on the snow plow in the park came out over the trail Tuesday and reported the presence of these fleas along the ski trail which is a sure sign of moderate weather, John says.

Several ski club members and directors of the coming Winter Sports Show freely expressed themselves yesterday as feeling mighty foolish in preparing for a winter sports show in the spring time. The prevailing spring weather actually having reached the Fort Klamath country and the Crater Lake park during the past few days.

The maximum temperature recorded on the government thermometer at Government Camp, Wednesday was 56 degrees and the extreme low Tuesday night was 31, according to a report from Rudy Luck, caretaker there.

Despite the mild weather and signs of spring old timers at Fort Klamath all firmly believe that there is more winter weather to come before February 22nd. Snow falls during February are recalled by many people in this country. On the nineteenth of February, five years ago a storm started that nearly blocked the highway and did prevent many folks from attending the first Winter Carnival. Several ranchers here today compared this weather with 1916-17 when a like condition existed for some time and was followed by a fall of four feet of snow in Wood river valley that remained on the ground till late in April.
