

INCREASE IN LIVESTOCK ON OREGON FARMS

The two principal classes of livestock in Oregon, cattle and sheep, both show appreciable increases in numbers on farms Jan. 1, 1931 as compared to a year ago, according to the annual report on livestock by the Federal-State Cooperative Crop Reporting Service. This increase is attributed chiefly to poor market conditions which have prevailed generally and which have tended to keep down marketings where conditions were such that the carrying of the stock was possible. The winter has been unusually mild generally and there has been plenty of feed. The natural tendency has been to continue to feed stock in the hope of an opportunity to dispose of them more advantageously. To further complicate the situation, more than the usual percentage of lambs and calves were raised last season due to large crops and favorable conditions.

In the sheep industry, therefore, the peak in numbers is reached and conditions are so unfavorable that little relief has been secured to date and the momentum acquired through the past several years is serving to further aggravate a very bad situation. The number of sheep on farms Jan. 1, 1931 in Oregon is estimated at 2,371,000 compared to 2,376,000 a year ago and 2,561,000 Jan. 1, 1929. This represents an increase of 6 percent over a year ago, an unusual increase caused by the very unusual conditions existing.

The total number of all cattle in Oregon as of Jan. 1 is estimated at 750,000 head which is an increase of 4 per cent over the Jan. 1, 1930 estimate. On Jan. 1, 1929 there were 693,000 head of cattle in the state. Milk cows and heifers over 2 years of age make up about 32 percent of this total or 240,000 head compared to 229,000 head a year ago. The dairy sections have kept pace with the beef producing sections of the state in the general increase in Oregon of all cattle.

A further reduction during 1929 in hogs has taken place according to the January first report which places the total number of hogs on farms at 189,000 compared to 195,000 a year ago and 230,000 in 1929. This represents a decline during the past year of three percent.

City Will Purchase Five Hundred Signs For Immediate Use

The meeting of the council as a committee of the whole last night at the city hall resulted in the selection of several lots as possible locations for the municipal fire station. These will be inspected at a

later date and a report will be made at the regular session of the council Monday night. Thirty-one different sites were considered at the committee meeting.

It has been announced by Mayor F. H. Cofer that 500 new street signs will be purchased by the city for marking streets. Work of erecting these is to start at once.

The signs will be nine feet in height, with a triangular

shaped bar for the pole and the sign, a dark blue background with white letters, pointing in two directions. Two feet of the pole will enter the ground and will be imbedded in cement.

While 500 signs will not be adequate to post every street, it is felt they will be a great improvement in street marking. Councilman Van Camp was in charge of selecting the signs.
