Intangibles Causes Row

The argument started over the appearance of Representative Allan Bynon of Multnomah county, Chris Bell, representing the Portland chamber of commerce; Ex-senator Robert S. Farrell of Portland; L. B. Smith, of the Greater Oregon association; Senator J. O. Bailey and others who insisted that the committee should approve the Bynon bill for a refund of the nearly \$900,000 collected under the intangibles tax act that was declared unconstitutional by the supreme court. Several of them said they favored the intangibles tax, some expressing the opinion that the supreme court was incorrect in its opinion, but they insisted that the state should refund the money and start anew.

Byron insisted that it was imperative that the state keep good faith with the people who paid "if it is not done," he said, "I predict that it will cost the state many hundreds of thousands of dollars in evasions of other taxes."

Honesty Involved

Bell said the Portland chamber of commerce had adopted a resolution that the tax should be refunded, declaring that "it is not a legal question, but a question of every day honesty and decency."

Smith exhibited clippings from Oregon newspapers in an attempt to prove that the state tax commission had actually promised a refund of the money if the law were not enacted, and criticized the commission for what he said was a change of front.

Bailey said he did not think either of the new intangibles tax bills that have been introduced were constitutional, and that he would not vote for either until assured that the refund on the old act would be made. Speaker Frank J. Lonsgeran of the house was of the opinion that the supreme court was wrong in holding the old act unconstitutional and urged that someone be named to carry the case to the United States supreme court. If the opinion that it is invalid stands he said the state could not escape the refund.

Argument Arises

An argument arose over the disposition that has been made of the money collected. C. C. Chapman said it was held "in suspense" by the state treasurer, but Senator B. L. Eddy declared it had gone to pay state expenses and that if the money were refunded it would be necessary for the state to issue nearly \$900,000 worth of interest-bearing warrants that would cost the state \$150 a day interest. He could see no logic in "handing the money back with one hand by refunding and then taking it back with the other hand by issuing the pending retroactive intangibles bill. Later Eddy suggested that the legislature might drop the retroactive bill and insert in the proposed permanent bill a clause providing for transferable certificates which, in the payment of other taxes, would give the holder credit for payments made under the invalid act.

HOPE HELD FOR COMPROMISE ON RELIEF FIGHT

WASHINGTON, Feb. 5. (AP)—An agreement on the relief controversy acceptable to both republican and democratic leaders in the senate was forwarded today to President Hoover.

Senators Watson of Indiana and McNary, of Oregon, the republican chiefs, promptly dispatched the compromise suggestion to the White House, urging acceptance.

The house leadership still must be consulted but the compromise was expected at the capitol to result in quick action, with the March 4 adjournment of this session drawing closer.

What attitude the president will take remains to be seen. He has taken an adamant position against making federal funds available to the Red Cross for relief purposes.

The proposal calls for an addition of \$25,000,000 to the drought loan fund already appropriated by congress to take the place of the disputed \$25,000,000 added by the senate to the interior department appropriation bill, and aimed to be given to the Red Cross. House republican leaders have opposed the fund vigorously.

The democratic forces have sponsored the \$25,000,000 fund. Under today's suggested compromise, there would be some liberalization of the terms under which the additional \$25,000,000 could be loaned to the drought stricken farmers.

The exact language of the agreement was withheld pending the outcome of the negotiations.

The solution for the controversy, which is threatening an extra session of the new congress in the spring, was "unanimously acceptable by both republican and democratic leaders in the senate."

Martial law has been declared and no one is permitted to enter the business district without a permit, lest what is left of the buildings may collapse.

There has been some looting but armed sentries were posted at various points throughout the town tonight.

SEATTLE, Feb. 5. (AP)—Two-year-old William "Buddy" Clark was homeless and unwanted today.

Yesterday his father, William Laverne Clark, in a fit of madness, killed his wife, his brother-in-law and his daughter and himself.

Buddy's uncles and aunts adopt him, unwilling to have what they termed the remainder of a dead father's brutality in their homes day after day. They said he is crippled because of beatings Clark gave his wife before the boy was born.

"Buddy was born in a Klamath Falls hospital at the same time his father was being treated for a concussion of the brain resulting from a logging accident."

VALIDITY OF COMMON USER BILL DEBATED

SALEM, Ore., Feb. 5. (AP)—Validity of the proposed common user measure by which private utilities will be compelled to grant use of lines and systems to municipally owned utilities, was questioned by Oswald West, former Oregon governor, before the joint utilities meeting today.

The bill under discussion, was introduced by Representative John H. Lewis. West contended that the original code, which the new act proposes to amend, provided reciprocal users rights between private companies, but the new act does not provide that municipalities should go into a reciprocal agreement. It is on this basis he believed the measure would be unconstitutional. Lewis argued the measure was designed to provide immediate entrance of new municipally owned companies leading to lowering of rates and increase of industrial enterprises.

Senator J. E. Bennett advocated consideration of his measure to provide a means of forcing telephone companies to enter cities and operate under franchise. He declared in many cities, the telephone company has a monopoly, and therefore does not renew its franchise with the city after its expiration. A privilege tax of not less than 5 per cent is also charged against the company's net earnings. By the bill this would bring into Portland alone a quarter million dollars, he stated.

The second public hearing on the hydro-electric commission bill was set for Monday morning, 8:30, by the committee.

Senator J. O. Bailey did not sign either report. The debate was over substitution of the minority report for the majority recommendation, and was opened by Moser. It was still in progress when noon recess was taken.

Criticizes Governor

Going into the history of the port, Senator Moser pleaded with the senate to take an unprejudiced attitude and vote their judgment on the basis of the record. Moser said he had no quarrel with Governor Meier, but that he had informed the executive that he would support his platform "which was so overwhelmingly approved by the people," but that there were certain matters mentioned in his inaugural message on which the people had not spoken and with which he could not agree. Moser charged the governor's port policy as contained in the message, charging that this had started the present port fight.

"I venture to say," Moser said, "that the governor did not write this, and that he did not write the special message on the port situation, for if he did he was not informed on the law. Someone informed the governor incorrectly, and I think I know who it was. His comment on the port is wholly erroneous."

Lauds Warren

Moser said that the governor had criticized the port commission as being an autocracy. "And now he wants to turn it into a monarchy. He points out in his message certain powers which he says should be taken away from the commission. He criticizes it as being responsible to no one. Does he in his message ask that any of these so-called evils be removed from the commission? He does not."

Leveling his finger at Representative Herbert Gordon, supporter of the governor's policy, who had come over from the house to hear the debate, Moser said that Gordon, in his speech in the house, had stated that he was responsible for Frank M. Warren being a member of the commission. Moser lauded the service given by Warren in that office.

STATE NOT TO OPPOSE CHANGE BOWLES TRIAL

PORTLAND, Feb. 5. (AP)—A statement suggesting The Dalles as the place to try the Bowles murder case was issued by the district attorneys office today, accompanying the announcement that the state will not oppose the defense motion for a change of venue.

Flood River county is mentioned, the statement said, because it is more remote from Portland than other counties suggested. In an affidavit George Mowry, deputy district attorney said that if public sentiment against Nelson C. Bowles and Irma Loucks is strong in Multnomah county, it must also be prevalent in Columbia, Clackamas, Yamhill and Marion counties.

He explained this by saying the defense motion is based "on so-called sensational articles in Portland newspapers, which also have a wide circulation in Willamette Valley sections."

The district attorney's statement that he will not oppose the change is based, he said, on the circumstance that denial of the change might be used as grounds for appeal if a conviction were obtained in Multnomah county.
