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Visitor  
Was Boxing  
Instructor of  
Princess Pat

Jack Walker, manager of Romeo LeMon who meets "Red" Stanley in the semi-final at Merrill tonight, tells many a thrilling tale about the famous Princess Pat regiment of Canada, which was annihilated during the early days of the World war.

"Of the original members of the regiment, only eight ever came back," was the dramatic statement made the morning by Jack to a Herald reporter. Walker, by the way, was boxing instructor of the Princess Pat regiment, accompanied that fighting contingent to Europe, saw its men mowed down like grain before the sickle, saw replacement come and go and shudders as he recalls the hundreds of fine young men—the flower of Canada's manhood—whose blood turned the black soil to crimson during those dark days of the war.

Walker resided in Detroit prior to sailing of the Princess Pat regiment, went across the border to Windsor, and joined the force as boxing instructor.

In addition to Lemon, Walker brought two others of his stable of fighting boys to Klamath Falls. They are Jesse Ayala and Red Mandotte.

GRANTS PASS  
WOMAN BURNS  
IN BUS WRECK

SAN CLEMENTE, Calif., Feb. 6. (AP)—Mrs. Velma Cole of Grants Pass, Ore., and a sailor of the United States navy known as "Whitey," were the two victims of the wreck of a motor stage which early yesterday skidded from a flooded road into a ditch and was burned. Twelve passengers escaped unhurt.

Mrs. Cole, 27, wife of Henry Cole, was the daughter of Percy Everett of Grants Pass and formerly lived in Portland. At the time of the accident she was on her way to San Diego to visit her uncle, Rev. E. G. Clark, pastor of the Church of God, and her brother, Herald P. Everett, at the naval base.

"Whitey," the sailor died in the flames after he had pushed Mrs. Cole from the bus in a futile attempt to save her life.

Two other sailors were severely, but not fatally burned.
