

DETECTIVE IS A WITNESS IN CANNON TRIAL

WASHINGTON, Feb. 6, (AP)—Taking of evidence against Bishop James Cannon Jr. was ended before a church board of inquiry late last night, as word came from within the hearing that among the testimony was an assertion that information which part of the charges against the prelate are based, came from Mrs. Helen McCallum, now Bishop Cannon's second wife.

Today the temperance leader of the Methodist Episcopal Church south came to the beginning of his own defense.

Arrested O'Malley, a reporter for the New York Journal, was among the witnesses who appeared before the board of twelve elders near the close of twelve testimony taking.

Bishop Cannon recently filed a \$5,000,000 suit for damages against William Randolph Hearst, publisher of the Journal, based on the publication of letters alleged to have been written by the bishop, and statements concerning him, which he claimed were libelous.

Frank Morgan, a Richmond, Va., detective, was the last witness called.

He testified concerning documents previously presented, the evidence in which he had obtained during months of investigating the conduct of Bishop Cannon.

On leaving the hearing the detective said that he had been given "a warm time."

"I had questions fired at me from every angle," he said, "but I had the answers."

Robert Thomas, a Richmond lawyer, Mr. Eugene Crawford, an associate of Bishop Cannon on the church board of temperance, and Hurt Ferrar, a handwriting expert, were other witnesses.

Every effort has been made by Bishop W. N. Almsworth of Birmingham, Ala., who is presiding, to keep the sessions secret.

Police guards are posted outside the church and inside a captain of detectives guards the only door left unlocked. No one is allowed to enter unless vouchered for by Dr. W. A. Shelton, pastor of the church.

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Water Users Plan Organization To Oppose Movement

Steps were taken to form an organization to oppose any action of the federal government to turn over water of the Upper Klamath lake, which it now controls, to the state of Oregon at a meeting of water-users held at the Mt. Laki school last night.

Among the 66 water-users of the Klamath Irrigation district and pumping district present, all of whom signified their intention to join the organization in this movement, was no dissent.

It is anticipated by water-users of the county that the government may turn over control of the water to the state, and it is felt that steps must be taken to insure plenty of water for irrigation in the Klamath reclamation projects.

Another meeting for discussion of this matter and to complete the organization of water-users will be held at the high school gymnasium in Merrill, Monday evening, at 7:30. It was announced last night by J. R. Elliott who has been elected chairman.

Malin Banker Is Returned to City

Deputy Sheriff Dale Mattoon last night returned from Denver with R. C. Dobrusky, former cashier of the Malin State bank, who is wanted here on several secret indictments in connection with Dobrusky's alleged illegal acts while cashier of the bank. The charges have not yet been made public but it is understood that they relate to notes, funds and reports of the bank and its customers.

Poultrymen Lose In Fight To Obtain A Lower Freight Rate

WASHINGTON, Feb. 6 (AP)—Co-operative dairy and poultry organizations in southern Idaho and eastern Oregon lost an attempt today before the interstate commerce commission to obtain freight rate reductions on shipments to California.

The complainants whose producing operations are located in the territory defined by Baker, Oregon, on the west, and Poca-

tello and Boise, Idaho, on the east, now are paying average rates of about \$1.60 per hundred pounds on consignments to San Francisco and about \$1.68 to Los Angeles. They asked reductions to \$1.44 on the San Francisco business and \$1.58 on the Los Angeles shipments.

Seal Sale Brought \$1,035 in County

Following a meeting of the Klamath County Public Health association, it was announced yesterday that \$1,035 was derived from the Christmas seal sale of the Anti-Tuberculosis association in Klamath county.

At this time there are a number of patients from Klamath county being treated at the tuberculosis hospitals in Salem and The Dalles. This is made possible through the Christmas seal sale sold throughout the county.

About 60 per cent of the money received from the sale of seals is used in health work in Klamath county.

Through Harry Hill, publicity chairman, the health association extended thanks to the California Oregon Power company, the Klamath County Chamber of Commerce and the Klamath News and Evening Herald for their aid in making the 1930 sale a success.

Weather Compels Laying Off of Men On Owyhee Project

SEATTLE, Wash., Feb. 6 (AP)—Although work on the \$6,000,000 Owyhee dam project near Vale, Ore., has ceased temporarily, the shut-down was caused by severe weather and not by lack of funds, as reported from Boise, according to M. C. McEachern, president of the General Construction company, contractors for the work.

Work will be resumed about March 1 if the weather moderates, McEachern said. Reports from Vale said a light crew is being retained but the force of 300 men has been released.

McEachern said, however, he believes there was "a shortage of funds" but that work will continue.

Charges Against Fuller Dismissed

Charges against B. Fuller were dismissed yesterday by Justice W. B. Barnes after Mary Whitney pleaded guilty to a charge of sale of liquor and was fined \$25.

The two women were charged with sale of liquor at the same

time and place by the "drink" to an officer. When officers raided the place later they were unable to find any intoxicants. The sale charge was filed.

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
