

CONGRESS ADJOURNS POLITICS

**Dove of Peace Returns
After Compromise
On Relief Bill**

**EXTRA SESSION NOW
SEEMS IMPROBABLE**

**Way Is Clear To Enact
Legislation Which
Nation Demands**

WASHINGTON, Feb. 7, (AP)—Prospects for avoiding a special session of congress were better today than at any time in weeks.

An agreement was reached late yesterday on relief legislation, satisfactory to all major groups in both senate and house and represented as hearing the approval of President Hoover. This snapped the tension in congress, cleared the major obstacle from the path of the necessary appropriation bills and led to the establishment of a new cooperation between regular republicans and democrats in the senate, in the interest of a peaceful solution of remaining controversies.

Conferees Agree
Conferees of the senate and house decided to complete formally this afternoon the agreement on a substitute for the \$25,000,000 appropriation to the Red Cross which was the principal bone of contention.

The new plan calls for appropriation of an additional \$20,000,000 drought loan to be available for "agricultural rehabilitation."

Some Doubt Exists
Whether farmers could borrow from it to buy food was not clearly stated, and the final decision would be left to the secretary of agriculture. Senate leaders believed the language broad enough. Senator Robinson of Arkansas, the democratic chief said he believed food loans "will be made." Senator Watson of Indiana, the republican leader pointed out:

"You cannot rehabilitate farms with dead farmers."

On the house side, republican leader Tilson said the plan "gets away from all ideas of a gratuity, or a dole, or charity because every dollar advanced on the loans will be secured."

Another Agreement Near
Disposition of several of the appropriation bills which have been held up in the relief deadlock was anticipated for next week. A source of trouble, however, still rests in the plans for aiding veterans but there too, signs of an agreement appeared.

The senate finance committee was to consider the subject again today, but the republican members wished to give jurisdiction to the house under its prerogatives in regard to revenue legislation. Chairman Hawley of the house ways and means committee, said his group would give the subject final consideration next Tuesday, and enactment within ten days of a bill to increase veterans' loans against compensation certificates with a \$500,000,000 appropriation was predicted by a ranking republican member of the group, Bacharach of New Jersey.

Bourbons Ask Harmony
A democratic bid for harmony was made last night by Senator Caraway of Arkansas, who, in a speech over a local radio station, apologized "if I have said anything unkind" about President Hoover.

The \$20,000,000 relief loan compromise was assailed today by Representative Laguardia, republican, New York. He termed it "economically impossible, politically disastrous, morally insincere and practically ineffective."

La Guardia Critical
"I hope the representatives of the farmers in the house will see through this and stand together as we did before," said La Guardia, who joined the democrats in the fight for a direct relief appropriation.

If the sponsors of the compromise are sincere in using these funds for the immediate relief of drought stricken farmers, said the New Yorker, "they know that they can never be repaid."

"If they do intend to press the farmer until the loan is paid, then instead of having the farmer in destitution for one season we will have him broke, poverty stricken and destitute for ten years."

At the request of the board of directors of the Klamath Irrigation District, representatives of the California Oregon Power company and small power users of the district were present at the regular meeting of the board held at 10 o'clock this morning. The purpose of the meeting was to consider application of electric rates to small pumping plants under 100 horse-power.

After considerable discussion, W. F. Jinnets and Charles W. Lewis, district farmers, were appointed to act with the board and with the power company, and to make a report next Saturday.

A Nefarious Bill

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islature it would have been compelled to run two trains in place of one, or accepted the only other alternative of leaving eight cars stand in the yards at Portland until 70 additional cars of freight had accumulated.

The attempt to meddle in the affairs of business and industry, including public utilities, is unwarranted.

There is no more excuse for the proposed law than for one limiting the stock a grocery store may carry, or the number of sales a clerk can make. It is as uncommon as it would be to place a limitation on the number of calls a telephone operator can make, or to limit the activities of any other business or industry to a given point as to output.

The element of danger is not the reason for this nefarious bill. Freight trains of 100-car length are operated today with perfect safety. This fact has been determined by exhaustive experiments of the American Railway association. Ponderous locomotives of unlimited power and the development of the airbrake system to a high state of efficiency permit handling of 100-car trains on mountain grades of 2 and 3 per cent with as great degree of safety as trains of half the length were formerly operated.

Naturally, railroad companies are marshalling their forces to defeat the bill. In this they deserve the support of the public and of every member of the legislature.

We have had enough of meddling with business.

The great state of Oregon can ill afford to entertain this plan for a minute. To grant it favorable consideration would be nothing other than an indictment on our intelligence and sense of fair play.

urer, the attorney general of the executive, is a question in which I am not vitally concerned.

Saving Is Desired
"I am, however, vitally interested in the financial saving that may be made for the benefit of the taxpayers by the enactment of this measure, and in the effective law enforcement and suppression of crime, and the reduction of the law that may be brought about by the consolidation of the several special law enforcement agencies into a single law enforcement department consistent with a business administration."

The governor points out that it now costs over \$1,000,000 a year to enforce the fish, game, forestry, prohibition and traffic laws, and that \$372,549 "is expended by you as secretary of state in the enforcement of traffic laws, and an additional \$200,000 is expended by the highway department in the enforcement of the same traffic laws. Certainly neither you nor anyone else can logically contend that such a division... can be especially conducive to efficiency."

The governor says that he "conservatively estimates" that the bill would save over \$250,000 a year in administration, "which saving alone ought to be sufficient to induce you to be willing to surrender up a function which... never properly belonged to your office."

Takes Rap at Hoss
Referring to Hoss' statement that he had made a considerable study of crime, and that he doubted whether crime would be reduced by a state police system, the governor says:

"You are, of course, entitled to your opinion, but I wish to remind you that under the present system our penitentiary, which you, as a member of the board of control, have administered for several years past, is now over-populated to the extent that it is necessary for the emergency board to provide funds for additional facilities, and that there is now a demand for more funds for the same purpose."

"It is my opinion that the state police system... will not only materially reduce the population in our state prison, but in our county and municipal jails, and will save the necessity for additional prison facilities and will reduce taxes."

NO MAJOR BILLS ARE ENACTED

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any bills being voted down in either house upon final passage. In addition to the bills passed by both houses, the lower branch passed 27 others and the senate approved 29 of its own proposals. This leaves 359 bills yet to be disposed of either in committee or on the floor.

It is expected that before the session closes the total bills introduced will exceed the 550 mark with several important acts yet to come out, particularly the ways and means bills for appropriation committees are still working on major measures, and hearings, held on the average of six daily, will be continued during the next week.

Important bills pending in the legislature, in addition to scores on salary increases, education, insurance, judicial and fish regulations, are the intangibles tax bills, old age pensions, administration utilities and power bills. The Grange district power bill is also in the hands of committees. The free-text book bill, which has not yet been reported out, nor has the state building code, and the anti-trust measures. The commercial fish code, embargo on agricultural products and the agricultural department measures have yet to be acted upon.

Other important bills introduced include a bill to amend the store license, common user bills, "gasoline cowboy" changes, Mr. Kenzie and Willamette fishing rules, oleomargarine excise tax and restriction proposals, creation of a tax commission and providing for tax collectors in counties. The state constabulary, which the subject of a controversy between the governor and secretary of state, and the uniform traffic laws are in committee. The Port of Portland commission measure controversy has not yet been settled and the police pension fund is under consideration.

President Wilson's "non-recognition policy" called forth Mr. Stimson's criticism. His refusal to recognize Huerta as president of Mexico because he gained power by force, Mr. Stimson said, was a departure from our historic policy of approving a new government as soon as it demonstrated its ability and disposition to discharge international obligations, without regard to the manner in which it was established.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 7, (AP)—Senator Robinson, of Arkansas, the democratic leader, today criticized Secretary Stimson of the state department for his address last night, saying the secretary of the state "went out of his way to make a somewhat stupid attack upon Woodrow Wilson."

Robinson Hits Stimson
The senate democratic leader, who served with Secretary Stimson on the London Naval conference mission, returned the secretary's attack upon the Wilson policies by pointing out what he termed "inconsistencies in the secretary's praise of the foreign policies" of the Hoover administration.

Robinson asked how the secretary of state squared the Hoover administration's policies toward recognition of the new governments in South America with the fact that his republican predecessors, secretaries Hughes and Kellogg "prompted the Central American states to enter into a treaty binding themselves not to recognize any government established by revolution or coup d'etat."

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BLAST ROCKS THEATRE IN LOS ANGELES

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 7, (AP)—Thirty persons were injured, several seriously, and a panic in a theatre audience of more than 2000 was narrowly averted when an explosion in a power main entering the Orpheum theatre shook the building late last night.

So terrific as the force of the blast that several persons were hurled again stone windows on the other side of the street. The injured were: George Dek, 39, taxicab driver, fractured skull; Vito Vitullo, 24, actor, serious burns and lacerations; Betty Deter, 12, first degree burns on face and body; Earl William O'Dell, 27, negro chauffeur, first degree burns; T. P. Ewing, 39, salesman, first degree burns.

A brilliant first night audience, augmented by the presence of more than 100 motion picture players, packed the theatre for the first showing of Cimarron, a picture featuring Richard Dix. Many film stars were on the stage making personal appearances, and the screen and stage attractions were drawing to a close when the roar of the explosion was heard and its shock felt in the theater.

After Fred Niblo, film director and other picture folk made vain attempts at quieting the audience at its first symptoms of panic, Robert McWade, veteran stage and screen actor, averted what save indications of being a fatal rash for extra by making a humorous, arresting announcement.

"Don't get excited, folks," cried McWade. "That noise was just part of the celebration in my honor."

The audience grew calm, a laugh ran through it, the showgoers returned to their seats, to file out in an orderly manner a short time later, when squads of police and firemen took charge of the situation. Det's taxicab parked in front of the theater and bearing a passenger was hurled high into the air, to hurtle down into a throng of persons at the entrance to the show house.
