Three Indictments Returned Against Former Malin Man

Indictments which were returned secretly by the December grand jury were made known yesterday in connection with the arrest of R. C. Dohrsky, former cashier of the Malin State bank, who was returned here from Denver late Thursday night by Deputy Sheriff Dale Mattoon.

Three indictments were returned. One charges larceny by embezzlement of \$18,000 of bank funds on December 28, 1928. The amount is said to have consisted of actual money, certificates and notes.

A second charge false entries on books or reports, alleging that false and untrue deposit slip in the amount of \$525 bearing the name of John and Nettie Cacka was made out by Dohrsky on December 15, 1929. It charges that the slip was made out with the intention to deceive A. A. Schramm, state superintendent of banks.

The third indictment charges that Dohrsky in October, 1929, was in possession of a note for \$3,000 made out November 28, 1928, by Harry H. Hundley and Hazel Hundley to John Cacka and Nettie Cacka and charging that a forged endorsement on the back makes the note payable to Dohrsky. It charges the names of John Cacka and Nettie Cacka are forged on the assignment of the note.
