Nancy Carroll, Fredric March in the Paramount Picture "Laughter" With Frank Morgan

When Nancy Carroll appeared in "The Devil's Holiday" at the Paramount Theatre in New York early last summer, the metropolitan newspapers were as one in citing her capabilities as a remarkably talented dramatic actress.

This public appreciation of her gift for the more weighty type of character-portrayal led Paramount to decide upon "Laughter" as her next dramatic release.

"Laughter" comes to the Pelican Theatre for a two-day run Sunday. It is an original story written by Douglas Duty and Harry D'Abadie D'Arrast.

In the play Nancy is seen as the ex-Police girl who marries a very wealthy old man, her "second choice," after her young lover forsakes her in favor of an exciting trip to Paris. Upon his return to New York her "first love" becomes a pal to Nancy's husband but slyly attempts to make advances to her. The dramatic and thrilling

events which follow are the high points of interest in this powerful show.

The part of the phlegmatic young lover is played by Fredric March, the capable young leading man who deserted the stage for the talkies about two years ago and who has since achieved considerable distinction as a portrayal of emotional roles.

He was in "The Wild Party," "The Studio Murder Mystery," "Sarah and Son," "True to the Navy" and "Manslaughter." March never played opposite Miss Carroll before this picture, and was only in one production with her—"Paramount on Parade." Being in different sketches in that famous revue picture, they were, of course, not exact "lovers" in it.

Others in the cast of "Laughter" are Glenn Anders, famous for his work in "Strange Interlude" on the Broadway stage; Frank Morgan, star of "Topaze," Broadway legitimate success; Diane Ellis, Leonard Carey, Worthington Romaine and others.

"Spectacle," interpreted in terms of striking motion picture sets and costumes, has long been a term specially associated with the name of Cecil B. De Mille, Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer producer-director.

With his "Zeppelin Ball" of "Madam Satan," which will open at the Pine Tree Theatre Sunday for two days, De Mille feels that he has achieved a worthy, popular successor to the "Cinderella Ball" of "Forbidden Fruit."

The Babylonian scenes of "Male and Female," and "The Sack of Rome" in "Manslaughter," and De Mille's current appeal to eyes that love color and charm draped human beings is laid aboard a Zeppelin, the property of Roland Young, comedian of the piece. A meeting on the Zeppelin between Bob Brooks (Reginald Denny) estranged from his wife, Kay Johnson, with a mysterious "Madam Satan," provides the principal plot impetus of Jeanie MacPherson's story. The denouement takes place just as the airship is torn loose from its mooring mast, forcing the guests to jump in parachutes.

The story starts in the home of Angela and Bob Brooks, who have grown apart from each other, and in the bedroom of Trizie, the other woman. It is from these earlier scenes that the story proceeds to the airship.

On the Zeppelin three special ballet numbers are presented by dancer-director Leroy Prinz, formerly of Earl Carroll's "Vanities." These are "The Cat Ballet," "The Clock Ballet" and "Ballet Mechanique," the latter featuring Theodore Kosloff as "Electricity."

As the ball is a masked one, Adrian, the designer, has carte blanche. Miss Johnson is, of course, "Madam Satan"; Lillian Roth, "Golden Pheasant" and Reginald Denny, an English yeoman. Others include Edwards Davis, "Henry the Eighth"; Tyler Brooke, "Romero"; Julianne Johnston, "Emerald"; Betty Francisco, "Little Rolls Riding Hood"; Wilfred Lucas, a Roman senator; Song numbers include "Live and Love Today," "All I Know Is You Are in My Arms," "This Is Love," "Meet Madam," "The Beauty Auction" and "Each Little Sin."
