LIST OF FACTS ABOUT KLAMATH ARE PUBLISHED

A list of facts and statistics concerning the city of Klamath Falls and Klamath county compiled by the chamber of commerce, to be placed on the back of their letterheads, has recently been brought up to date.

The estimated population of Klamath county on February 1, is given as 32,497. Other information listed is tax valuation for 1930, \$40,886,917.95; number of farms, 1,198; average acreage, 165.3; agricultural income for 1929, \$5,722,350; improved acreage in farms, 160,609; area under irrigation, 198,748. The area in square miles and acres, duty of water, number of schools and enrollment, number of mills and their employment and the mileage of state highway are also given.

The area of Klamath Falls is given as five square miles. The population on February 1, 1930, is 3,249. The average annual precipitation is listed as 12.77 inches; the mean annual temperature, 47.2 degrees; number of clear days in 1930, 211; the assessed valuation in 1930, \$10,823,739; telephone connections, 3,779; postal receipts for 1930, \$88,841.66; building permits, \$1,266,727, and the value of school property, \$1,243,000. Along with other information the enrollment of schools, number of churches, lodges, hospitals, theaters, railways and highways are given.

French and the Real Estate Exchange have had the list of facts printed on the backs of their letterheads in addition to the chamber of commerce.

Lauds Lincoln And Says Story of Ann Rutledge Is a Myth

PORTLAND, Feb. 13. (AP)—Several hundred persons gathered here last night to pay tribute to the memory of Abraham Lincoln. It was the 15th annual affair sponsored by the republican organizations of the city, county and state.

Claude E. Ingalls, editor of the Corvallis Gazette-Times, and principal speaker of the evening, stressed Lincoln's belief in party government and party regularity.

In touching on Lincoln's private life Ingalls made an appeal to the women to take steps to repudiate the "Ann Rutledge myth," to the effect Lincoln had gone through life with a broken heart because of Ann's death.

This story is marked by malicious falsehood, Ingalls said, declaring it is time to accord Mrs. Lincoln her rightful place in history.
