

OPponents OF BIRTH CONTROL HAVE AN INNING

WASHINGTON, Feb. 14. (AP)—Opponents of the Gillett bill to legalize dissemination of birth control information today marshaled their testimony before the senate judiciary subcommittee.

Ralph Burton, of Washington, representing the National Patriotic league, decried advocates of birth control "have been used as cats paws by communistic propagandists."

He said passage of the bill proposed by Senator Gillett, republican, Massachusetts, would "break down the marriage state and foster free love."

A lengthy list of those supporting the measure appeared yesterday.

"This bill would facilitate and encourage the distribution into every part of the country of obscene and indecent publications," said William F. Montavon of the National Catholic Welfare conference.

"In his latest annual report the Postmaster General comments in no uncertain terms on the danger already existing. This bill would open the flood gates and would irretrievably injure the morals along with the health of the nation."

He said passage would "in great measure nullify" existing laws in many states prohibiting circulation of birth control information.

Representative McCormack, Massachusetts, assailed what he described as "the principal argument advanced by the proponents yesterday—namely that the world is in danger of over population."

"The earth," he said, "is capable of supporting seven billion and now contains only about 1,750,000,000. The evils of poverty and disease do not flow from over population but from failure of government to combat them properly."

"I challenge the statement that thousands of women are sponsoring this bill," said Mrs. Mary T. Norton, democratic representative from New Jersey.

Opposition of the American Federation of Labor to the Gillett bill was announced by Edward F. McGrady, its legislative representative.

The sum of \$1400 requested by the state child welfare commission was reduced to \$26,379, the 1929 appropriation.

Whether disbursement complaints filed against attorneys should be kept secret until preliminary investigation has been made was a question for debate in the senate, the bill being re-referred. The bill provides that complaints shall be filed with the grievance committee of any bar association, with a district attorney or with the attorney general. If they find the complaint justified the matter is then taken to the supreme court and is not made public until that time.

Senator Bennett's bill providing for a privilege tax by cities against utilities operating without franchise was re-referred, on his motion, to the committee on railroads and utilities when it came up for third reading.

The Bennett-Brown bill which would repeal the existing "gasoline cowboy" act and enact another placing restrictions on the state veterinarian as an administrator of the act and also on inspection work, was withdrawn by its authors.

The Kiddle-Eddy bill providing for a distribution of state highway funds to counties in lieu of the state market road tax was withdrawn in favor of another measure.

House bill 14, by Schaupp, relating to the impounding of stock at large in counties was killed by indefinite postponement.

LAWMAKERS HAVE ONE MORE WEEK

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senate killed the move for municipalities assessing a two mill levy for maintenance of municipal bonds, and the house on the floor killed the bill regulating stock running at large. These were the only three bills defeated on the floor of both houses, while the governor has yet to exercise his first veto.

New measures introduced near the 600 mark, a statistical review of accomplishment and activities revealed. The house introduced 325, while the senate brought in 243. Of this total only 141, or one-fourth, have been disposed of either by passage in both houses or killed or withdrawn. One hundred forty-seven have gone half way through, passing one of the houses. This leaves 301 still in committee.

The governor has signed 39 bills, 13 of the house bills and 26 of the senate proposals. Eighteen others have passed both houses, and are ready for the executive action. The house has passed 74 others, while the senate approved 53 of its own. Eighty-four bills have dropped by the wayside, either by withdrawals, indefinite postponement or defeated on the floor. The house has withdrawn 35, indefinitely postponed 18 and killed 10 on the floor. The senate withdrew 19, indefinitely postponed 11 others, and defeated one on the floor.

In addition to major measures, there still remain to be acted upon many different measures, other power and utility provisions, the matter of depositing all funds into one general department for appropriation, the curb on the emergency board's activities, oleomargarine tax and chain store licenses, election provisions, other power and utility provisions, the banking code, state building code, department of agriculture bill, non-partisan judiciary, child welfare provisions and aid from families and estates institutions.

The game code, commercial fishing code and game commission changes are also before the legislators, along with insurance and drug bills, tax collector provision for counties and a bill dealing with abstracting titles. These are augmented by the anti-trust proposal, the gasoline cow-boy revisions, cream grading bills, licensing pawnbrokers, and many pertaining to different sections.
