

History Pioneer Church Compiled For Celebration

Pioneer Member Completes Work of Assembling Outstanding Facts Connected With Klamath's Oldest Church

The 47th anniversary of the founding of the First Presbyterian church, the parent church of Klamath Falls, will be celebrated with a pioneer dinner Thursday evening, February 19, in the church parlors at which pioneers who have been here 40 years and over will be special guests of honor. Reservations are open, however, to all others who wish to attend.

The occasion recalls the history of the church since its meagre beginning in Linkville with only seven members in its congregation, which now has 400 members throughout almost the entire county.

The facts of the founding of the church and its growth have been assembled by Dr. George L. Wright, one of the oldest members of the church, and follow:

The First Presbyterian church of Klamath Falls was founded by Rev. Robert McClean, a pioneer missionary and formerly a missionary in Chile who was then living on a homestead on upper Klamath Lake, near the present site of Algoma.

Seven Charter Members
The church started with seven charter members. They were Robert T. Baldwin and his daughter, Mrs. Hattie Roberts, Mr. and Mrs. Boughton, Mrs. Robert McClean and Mr. and Mrs. William A. Wright (father and mother of Dr. George L. Wright).

At first meetings were held in a room in the Linkville hotel, then owned by Judge G. W. Smith.

Funds Are Raised

A few months later the town was visited by a Presbyterian layman, Bayard Henry of Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, who saw the possibilities for future development of this community and offered to donate one half the cost of a new church building.

With this offer as an incentive a canvass was made and subscriptions taken for the first church building in Klamath Falls, then known as Linkville. It was located on Ewanna hill on the site where the Wattenburg residence now stands. The work of building was carried on under leadership of Rev. Enos McClean, a brother of Rev. Robert McClean. Rev. Enos McClean was pastor of the church at that time, having succeeded his brother who moved to Grants Pass.

Bell Still Used

One of the greatest events in the archives of the church was the swinging of the first church bell, the echoes of which were the first to be heard in Klamath. That same bell is still being used to call the church members to worship every Sunday, and it is now located in the present Presbyterian church building.

The first ruling elder of the church was William A. Wright. He was followed by Frank H. McCormack, one of the prominent early pioneers of Klamath county.

Sails Rough Seas

The first church had all the vicissitudes of a pioneer church in a small town of four hundred people. An echo of this is seen in the changing procession of preachers that came and went to other fields. The pulpit has been occupied by over 20 ministers in its 47 years, the majority of these during the first 10 years of existence.

During the pastorate of Rev. William Dierdorff a manse was built adjoining the church on the corner of Third and Pine streets, and occupied by the pastors for many years.

Erect New Church

With the advent of the Southern Pacific railroad in 1909 Klamath Falls began to fulfill its foreseen destiny and it soon became evident that a new church building would be necessary. First steps for a new church were then taken in 1910, but the old Ankeny canal proved an almost unsurmountable obstacle and the project was abandoned for a few years.

After the war the present site at Sixth and Pine was acquired and a new church constructed during the pastorate of Rev. E. P. Lawrence.

The church has increased its size from a membership of seven to about 400 and is now one of the leading Presbyterian churches in Oregon.

LARGEST CRANE

COLLINGWOOD, Ont. — What is thought to be the most powerful crane in the world has been constructed here. It is to be used to lift gates in the Lake Ontario entrance to the Welland canal. SCHOOL GIRL IS STILL MISSING

SAN DIEGO, Calif., Feb. 15, (AP)—Although an intense search by more than 1000 men and women and 200 boy scouts yesterday failed to yield a trace of Virginia Brooks, missing 10-year-old school girl, police entered the fifth day of the hunt today determined they will find her.

The officers have a good description of a man seen walking with a girl whom the woman believed was Virginia Brooks, within a half a dozen blocks of the girl's home at 8:30 Wednesday morning. Virginia left home for school that morning and failed to reach school. Police are withholding the woman's name, but are watching the section of the city in which they believe the man she described lives.

Feeling is high here, citizens believing the girl either was kidnapped or has been killed. Neighbors said the child was interested in her school work and contented at home. They doubt, they said, that she ran away.

Many miles of brush-covered canyons and arroyos were covered foot by foot yesterday by the large army of volunteer searchers. Numerous persons were questioned by police, who are following up even the smallest clue. A man who said he was "not seeking publicity" made an anonymous offer of \$500 for the arrest of Virginia's kidnappers, bringing the reward total to \$900.

Crazed Man Wields Hatchet on His Wife
LAWRENCE, Mass., Feb. 15, (AP)—A crazed man today inflicted nine hatchet wounds on his wife when she went to the first of his 19-year-old son who had been scalded by boiling water buried by his parent. He was captured only after he had plunged through a second story window and tripped on an icy pavement, breaking his arm.

The man was Joseph Stolorz, 45, an alleged demented weaver. He was placed in a hospital charged with attempted murder. His wife, Helen, 39, is in critical condition with two fractures of the skull.

LOUIS MANN IS CANCER VICTIM

NEW YORK, Feb. 15, (AP)—Louis Mann, actor, is dead. On and off the stage, he was the veteran comedian from three to 65.

Ill with cancer for the last two months, he suffered a relapse on Tuesday and died last night at Mt. Sinai hospital in spite of an emergency operation. With him at the end were his wife, Clara Lipman, herself an actress; Fannie Hurst, the writer, and Congressman William I. Sivovich.

As death drew nigh, the portrayer of countless comedy roles and the inventor of such famous quips as "It is to laugh," grew serious.

"No, I have no fear of death," he said. "But I have fought as long as I could, and now I am losing the battle."

Louis Mann seldom forgot he was a funny man. His depiction of the East Side father struggling valiantly and humorously to keep his brood together, his high "Split fence" collars, his antics with a telephone, his tricks of mispronunciation, his flaring temperaments, made him known and beloved wherever the footlights flashed.

Born in New York, he was educated under pressure at the University of California, deserting in the middle of his course to join a stock company in San Francisco. But before that he was an actor. He made his first appearance as a lot of three in a children's pantomime called "snowflake." He made his last in "That French Lady" in 1927. In between he played the leading part in more

than 40 plays and toured America from one end to the other. His lifelong fear that he would be buried alive will be respected through cremation.

Queen Victoria Is Hurrying to Madrid
LONDON, Feb. 15, (AP)—Queen Victoria of Spain left London today to return to Madrid, where a political crisis has led to unsettled conditions.

King George and Queen Mary accompanied her to Victoria station.

Queen Victoria came here several days ago to the bedside of her mother, the Princess Beatrice, who is suffering from a broken arm and bronchitis.

It was unusual for both the king and queen to bid her goodbye at the station, and there was a scene of touching farewell as Queen Victoria boarded her train.

WIFE LOOKS ON AS HUSBAND DIES IN CRASH

WASHINGTON, Feb. 15, (AP)—A little test spin in a new flying boat over the Potomac river yesterday cost the life of Donald Stevens, radio engineer of the department of commerce.

A friend who was taking the plane south asked him to give it a try. Stevens' wife sat in her car on the river bank while he took it up for 15 minutes of maneuvering. The engine started to land, and at about 200 feet the machine went into a slow spin and splashed into the river. Mrs. Stevens saw it all.

Strapped in, Stevens was drowned. He was practically uninjured by the crash, but must have been stunned and unable to loosen the safety belt.

A launch from the naval air station nearby rushed to Stevens' plane, but the fliers were unable to revive him.

Stevens for a little over two years had been attached to the aeronautics division of the commerce department. Most of his work was in the air, testing all over the country, radio beacons and communications systems being established on the airways. His home was in Monticello, Minn. He graduated from the university of that state and gained experience as a pilot in the naval reserve at the Great Lakes station.
