

DEATH TAKES GOV. EMERSON OF WYOMING

CHEYENNE, Wyo., Feb. 19. (AP)—Governor Frank C. Emerson of Wyoming died suddenly last night after a heart attack attributed to a five-day illness from pneumonia. He was 48 years of age.

While the governor's illness was expected by his physicians to reach a critical stage last night, they believed he would survive because of progress he made during the day. Shortly before he died, Governor Emerson said he felt slightly improved and his pulse was almost normal.

A. M. Clark, secretary of state, said he would issue a proclamation today declaring a vacancy in the governorship and at the same time declare himself acting governor until a successor is chosen at the state election in 1932. Both Clark and Governor Emerson belonged to the republican party.

The state legislature which was in night session recessed when word of the governor's death was conveyed to the members.

Governor Emerson was the second Wyoming chief executive to die in office within a period of about seven years. Governor William B. Ross died in office in 1924.

Diligence in pursuing his vocation as an engineer played a major role in Governor Emerson's rapid rise in Wyoming politics. His work on numerous engineering projects in the state from 1904 until 1919 resulted in his appointment as state engineer.

Born in Saginaw, Mich., May 26, 1882, Governor Emerson received an engineering degree from the University of Michigan in 1904. He came to Wyoming the same year. In 1910 he was married to Zoula Jean Reynolds, also a graduate of the Michigan university. Surviving him are his widow and three sons.

Miniature Sawmill Constructed Here On Long Journey

A miniature sawmill, complete in every detail even to the pond, which was constructed by a lumber company of this city two years ago to be displayed at the annual county fair, now has a travelogue behind it.

The little mill has been loaned by the Klamath county chamber of commerce to cities throughout the Northwest to be displayed at wood products shows and fairs and wherever it has been exhibited has never failed to create interest.

Idaho, Tacoma

On May 9, 1929, the mill was loaned to the Clearwater Timber company at Lewiston, Idaho, to be used as a feature of an exhibition.

September 4, 1930, it was in

Tacoma, Wash., where it was exhibited at a wood products show, sponsored by the 4-L Wood Promotion committee of Tacoma mill employees.

From September 22 to 27, 1930, the model was seen by many who attended the Oregon state fair at Salem.

Portland, Seattle

Portland sent for the little mill in October, 1930, to display it at a wood products show which was held from October 28 to November 1.

This past week the mill model has been in Seattle, Wash., where it attracted attention at a forest products exhibition held in connection with a meeting of the Loyal Legion of Loggers and Lumbermen, February 10 to 14.

The chamber of commerce makes no charge for use of the model except for freighting it to the point where it is to be displayed, and the only request is that credit be given to Klamath county wherever it is exhibited.

OIL COMPANY AID TO CITY
