

## PRINCES ARE OPPRESSED BY RARIFIED AIR

LA PAZ, Bolivia, Feb. 20. (AP)—The Prince of Wales, oppressed by the high altitude of this mountain capital, hurried back today across the Andes to Antofagasta, Chile, after spending just seven and one-half hours in La Paz.

In that time he crowded an official reception at the executive palace where he and General Blanco Gallardo, president of the military junta, exchanged decorations, another reception at the town hall, a final reception at the British legation, and dinner with the president at the palace.

Both he and Prince George, although commenting that the trip from Cuzco, with its delightful mountain scenery and across Lake Titicaca had greatly impressed them, were obviously tired and oppressed by the rarified atmosphere here.

The ceremony at the executive palace lasted only five minutes, the Prince of Wales bestowing on General Blanco the order of the British Empire and the president planning upon both the grand cross of the Condor of the Andes.

## Assign Judge Lusk To Sit In Case of Mrs. Emma Fowler

LA GRANDE, Ore., Feb. 20. (AP)—Judge Hall S. Lusk of the Multnomah county circuit bench has been assigned to this county to hear the case of Mrs. Emma Fowler, former city treasurer, charged with larceny of public funds.

Judge Lusk will take the place of Judge J. W. Knowles, fled an affidavit of prejudice. Judge Knowles will fill Judge Lusk's position in Portland.

Mrs. Fowler is charged with larceny of approximately \$112,000 of public money.

## Brief Notes of Pioneer Dinner

Reminiscences of pioneers who were called upon to speak by Toastmaster C. R. De Lap at the pioneer reunion, the 47th anniversary of the Presbyterian church, last evening brought forth many good laughs from the 175 people in attendance.

The prize story of the evening, and one which almost "brought the house down" was told by Billy Shook, the second oldest pioneer in the county, who told of taking his fair maiden to the dance in the old dance hall in Linkville many years ago. "Twas a dark and dreary night, and there were no sidewalks in Linkville at the time. The young lad walked ahead of the girl in order to discover the mud holes and other impediments which were between them and the dance hall. The manner in which he told the story was inimitable. He could have kept talking a week and held the interests of his audience.

"I got in a pack of trouble once, and it really was trouble," stated Mrs. Katie McMillan, one of Klamath's early pedagogues. "Once I tried to teach a group of youngsters that it was wrong if they didn't put decimals in their answers to arithmetic problems. All of them had the correct figures in their answer, and they thought that was enough. Ten of them put the decimals in, and all but these ten were given zero.

"Well, the next day I had all the mothers in town storming the schoolhouse, and almost insisting that I be fired. Not until Al Leavitt and Alex Martin sent word up that the schoolmaster was right, did they cease threatening me," she recalled.

Charles E. Drew, stated that he was born in Langell valley in Lake county 51 years ago and that two years later his sister was born in Langell valley, Klamath county.

B. S. Grigsby, who has been here since 1877, said that he hauled freight here from Roseburg to Fort Klamath, and also brought in the first load of furniture for Judge Smith's hotel. "I've been here 53 years, and I hope to stay 53 years more," he concluded.

Mr. and Mrs. John Uerlings came to Linkville from California on March 6, 1885. Mr. Uerlings recalled that they left California on the day that Grover Cleveland was inaugurated president of the United States. They settled here on the Emmitt ranch for a short time.

Marion Hanks, who has been here since 1873, told many tales about the hard winter of 1873. He also stated that he was one of the boys who belonged to the baseball club, and of course didn't have much time to go to church on Sundays, unless his girl happened to be there.

Richard Breitenstein was called upon to speak and stated that he came here in 1879.

One of the oldest pioneers remembered "way before there was a post office in Linkville, and said that he had to go to Ashland (a two week's trip) to secure mail.

Three members of the Linkville orchestra, which made its first appearance in the first Presbyterian church were at the dinner. They were M. Looney, John Uerlings and John F. Houston.

Special honor was due the John V. Houston family. Mr. and Mrs. John Houston are the pioneer couple who have continuously resided in Klamath county longer than any other couple. Although Emmitts were here before Houstons, they did not remain in Klamath county the entire time. Houstons, four sons were present. They were Fred, Mrs. Ward, whose father came here in 1884, told how the big Linkville fire was put out by

Will, Leo and John. Twelve members of the Houston clan were seated at the same table. Mrs. Houston commented that she made them all come because she was afraid that the Emmitt clan might outnumber the Houstons unless they turned out en masse.

Mrs. C. R. De Lap, wife of the county clerk, remarked that the De Laps had made Klamath county their home for 47 years. W. O. Hill came to the county on September 20, 1869, and landed at Shippington.

Judge A. L. Leavitt gave one of the finest talks of the evening, commending the fine spirit of the pioneers and recalling the hardships which they endured to build the foundation on which Klamath Falls now stands. "I feel like a newcomer," he said, "and lots of the oldtimers still call me 'the kid.' "On the last stroke of 12, February 6, 1893, the term Linkville ceased to have any geographical, historical or municipal significance. From that time it became a memory and Klamath Falls a reality," remarked Judge Leavitt.

Judge R. S. Orr, at one time county judge, who has lived in Klamath county since 1885, with the exception of a short vacation of 25 years which he spent in Nevada, told one of the most interesting tales of the evening. At one time, he said, W. E. Bowdoin, publisher of the Klamath Star, was unable to get paper into Linkville, on which to print the weekly paper. It was necessary to keep up the legal notices, so the resourceful printer secured a lot of wrapping paper, and the doings of the community and all legal notices were recorded on wrapping paper for four or five weeks.

"Nor were the snake stories forgotten. Many of Klamath's newcomers believe that the pioneers tell the snake stories merely to tantalize them and to frighten children. But several 'bumdingers' were recalled last night. Judge Orr and C. R. De Lap both told of the days when the females were more timid than they are today, and when walking along the wooden sidewalks they were also preceded by some gallant gentleman who would use his cane to hit the snakes on the head and make them crawl back under the cracks in the sidewalk.

"That reminds me—" started Captain Applegate, and he continued his story by relating stories of the deep mud which sounded Paul Bunyan-ish.

Recollections over the rejoicing when the first real horse and buggy roads were built through Klamath county were voiced by Mrs. L. F. Willis.

Mrs. Louise Humphrey is one of the old settlers of Linkville days. It took her eight months to come to this part of the country, traveling by oxen team.

Mrs. Ward, whose father came here in 1884, told how the big Linkville fire was put out by

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turning the water from the canal through the city.

Mrs. Henry Gerber was another of the pioneers whose recollections were linked with those of the others.

Scores of others who had been here 40 years and more were present but the time was too limited to call on them all.

## Ski Racers Have Ended Strenuous Training Period

FORT KLAMATH, Ore., Feb. 20. (Special)—Forty-two mile ski racers will have completed their training on the race course, and made his final trip to the lodge Friday. Saturday will probably be spent in light gymnasium work and the fixing up of skis and poles for the struggle Sunday morning.

This fixing up of skis is a very particular business, and much time is spent by the scientific skier in preparing and applying a preparation to enable him to slide over the snow with the least possible effort.

Entirely different "dope" is required for the various snow conditions. When skis are prepared for a crusty or dry snow and the wet snow is encountered, going becomes hard. It is indeed a problem to prepare skis for the 42-mile race, where several entirely different snow conditions might be encountered on the one trip.

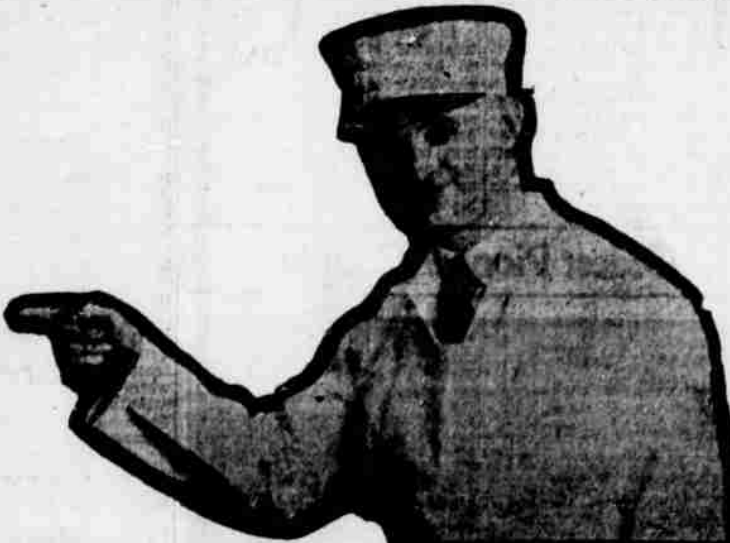
