Jackets More Popular Than Ever

Jackets of one type or another are practically "standard equipment" on dresses shown by the local ready-to-wear houses. Boleros, peplums and beaded tuxedo coats are frequently made of a contrasting color to the dress.

The dresses are generally one-piece princess models or are made to give the tuck-in blouse effect. These frocks usually have short sleeves, but when the sleeves are long, the jackets have three-quarter sleeves and the dress sleeves show underneath.

For afternoon wear printed chiffon frocks are featured with velvet jackets. Some of them are bordered with bands of fur around the necklines and sleeves.

Many daytime dresses feature lingerie neckwear, usually of embroidered white organdie in double flower treatments under a ruffled collar and circular cuffs of dress fabric.

Print combinations including plaids, stripes and checks are used in jacket costumes to contrast with either the coat or dress. The principal colors are black, blue, red, green, brown and tan.
