RAZLAFF IS HIGH CLASS MIDDLEWEIGHT

Herman (The German) Ratzlaff has signed to meet Romeo LeMon, San Diego, at Merrill next Monday night, March 2. It was announced last night by Joe Bickerstaff, matchmaker for the Tule Lake Post of the American Legion which is sponsoring the card.

Following the presentation of three great fights which would be a credit to any large city on the Pacific coast Matchmaker Bickerstaff is presenting two great middleweights that are always welcomed by fight fans for their fighting ability. Ratzlaff, of Portland, and the fighting San Diego high school boy who made such a great showing against Wesley Ketchel on the last card.

Ratzlaff's Record
Ratzlaff who has fought over 18 main events in Portland has met such stars as Gorilla Jones, second best middleweight in the world; Leo Lonski, Young Firpo, George Dinn, Wesley Ketchel, Ray McQuillen and others of like caliber is named "The Iron Man of the Ring." With a heart of steel this southpaw is perpetual motion when in action and always forces the issue. He has never backed up.

Fans are in for a treat for LeMon is also the tear in variety which assures worlds of action. The youthful Spaniard, French boy made a friend of every fan in the house for his game showing against the hard-punching Ketchel who termed him "the toughest boy I ever met" after the bout.

LeMon Wants Battle
LeMon is anxious to show again and doesn't want any set-up of opponents. "The best in the ring" is his order and in Ratzlaff he meets a high class fighter with a good record. The German's record does not impress or worry LeMon for he has met and defeated as good fighters as Ratzlaff has.

LeMon holds a key over that great welterweight, Dummy Mahan, who met sudden death when he jumped from an airplane to restore his hearing. Mahan was classed as a real contender for the world's championship. He has also defeated Charley Cobb, Johnny Romero "The Bandit," Young Harry Wills, Al Trulmans Homer, Sheridan, Dave Jackson, Joe Vargas, John Bandetti and many others.

The bout will attract fans from all Southern Oregon as Ratzlaff has fought many times in the state.

Two Victories
Ketchel's technical knockout of LeMon was a win for "the hardest punching middleweight in the game" but for the boy with his eyes so filled with blood that he could not see, who got up from the mat and was ready to continue fighting when the bout was stopped and who in the second round had Ketchel all but knocked out, it was a victory of a different kind.

To fans the fight of LeMon meant a fighting heart, ability to punch, speed and a fighter who is destined to reach the top of the ranks in his division. Ratzlaff has a tough job on his hands next Monday night.

If you don't believe so ask the other fighters in the city who have refused to box with LeMon in the gym.

BERKELEY, Cal., Feb. 25. (AP)—Students of the University of California were prepared to turn out at noon today in a rally on the steps of the campanile to welcome their new football coach, "Navy Bill" Ingram.

BOWLING FANS ENTHUSIASTIC OVER TOURNEY

Bowling fans of the city are enthusiastic over the idea of getting out as large a delegation as possible to attend the coming Northwest international bowling congress and tournament to be held in Portland the last week in April and the first week in May.

Steps have already been taken to interest the congress to consider Klamath Falls as the place in which to hold the 1932 show. If this city can send about a dozen teams to compete in this year's tournament, much will have been done to show that the invitation has the proper backing. It is stated. The civic clubs will be asked to assist in the preliminaries as well as seeing that the tournament, if secured, is a credit to the usual enterprisers in this city, and comes to a successful and creditable conclusion.

Such a convention brings to the city hundreds of people but unlike the ordinary convention lasts for a period of about 18 or 20 days and the hotels and cafes are not over crowded as the bowlers and rosters come for two or three days and after their schedule games are completed, leave and others from other cities take their places, avoiding all congestion.

The tournament is open to the world but has never been held south of Portland and the committee will put forth the argument that Klamath Falls is the most centrally located city on the coast with proper facilities for holding such an affair.

Entries could be secured from over a hundred California teams because of the accessibility of the city from the south and with the fine conditions of the highways from the north, a big entry could be expected from northern Oregon and Washington.

They muddled around the court for seven minutes before scoring, and ended the half at the bottom of a 23 to 9 score. ERNIE SCHAAF LICKS JACKSON

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 25 (AP)—Ernie Schaaf, heavyweight protege of Jack Sharkey, brought to the Pacific coast by the Boston sailor man to show his wares, defeated Dynamite Jackson, Los Angeles negro, last night by a decisive margin.

The 10,000 fans were roused to their feet in the tenth round by a fierce rally by Jackson, who made the going a little better than even. Schaaf weighed 199, spotting the negro fighter 11 pounds, but took six of the rounds. The fifth was Jackson's and the rest even.

The battlers hit a speedy clip from the opening gong. The Bostonian cut Jackson badly about the face and punished him with body blows, but the Los Angeles boy still had punch at the finish. Fans cheered the fighters and Sharkey, who seconded Schaaf, as they left the ring.
