

MEER SIGNS BILL CHANGING HIGHWAY NAME

SALEM, Ore., Feb. 28, (AP)—The coast highway will now be known as the Oregon coast highway rather than the Roosevelt. The bill providing this change was signed by Governor Julius L. Meier, along with seven election law changes and other measures. The house also passed the bill providing for better grades and standards. Survey of the calendars indicate that the session will continue into next week.

Approval of an appropriation of \$15,000 to be used by the state highway department with the effort to bring the Legion National convention to Portland in 1937, and passage of a bill which provides for an apartment house landlord's lien on the personal property of tenants were among the more important bills passed by the senate. Both were house bills.

The money allowed the Legion is not direct appropriation. It is a diversion from the war veterans' educational aid fund established here by the legislature several years ago and which is no longer in general use.

The landlord's lien bill proved one of the most controversial of the past week in the legislature. The senate engaged in an extended debate on the bill Tuesday and Wednesday. An even longer debate preceded its final passage. The negative votes were: Bailey, Bennett, Burke, Carner, Dunn, Eddy, Fisher, Jones, Kiddie, Stayer, Upton, Wheeler and Woodward.

House bills prohibiting boat fishing on the upper portions of the Deschutes and the McKenzie rivers were passed and the senate killed by indefinite postponement. Byron house bill to prohibit the requirement that teachers shall disclose their religious affiliations, a majority of the senate believed that expediency and not prejudice is the basis of the present requirement.

Under a senate concurrent resolution adopted by the senate the state capital is to be controlled by remote control with KOAC, the radio station at Oregon State college. It was said that headquarters of the new state police system will make use of the connection.

A senate concurrent resolution on the death of Samuel Hill was adopted. The resolution is to be signed by Governor Julius L. Meier, President Willard L. Marks of the senate and Speaker Frank J. Loneragan of the house, and will be presented to the Hill family. The legislature took particular cognizance of Mr. Hill's death for the reason that he was on his way to Salem to address a joint session of the house and senate when he became ill.

"TRIANGLE" TAX LAW DISCUSSED

Of the money collected under the 1937 intangibles law, a group of Portland business men, representing some of the larger industries in the state, waited upon Governor Julius L. Meier, President Willard L. Marks of the senate, and Speaker Frank J. Loneragan of the house, protesting the increased excise tax rate.

Protests heard. They declared the 3 per cent raise on the corporation tax would keep other industries out of the state and tend toward driving those now doing the major part of their business outside the state to locate in some other state. Protest against the 8 per cent tax on incomes from intangibles was also voiced. The delegation was headed by John A. Zehnhauser of the Knitting Mills, and L. B. Smith of the Greater Oregon association.

Governor Meier agreed with protesters to the extent that he would like to see a tax reduction, but he emphatically told the delegation that the program as mapped out by the tax committee, the state tax commission and other legislative leaders was the only thing which would prevent this state from being thrown into a chaotic condition, and the state faced with rebellion by real property owners.

Galloway Cites Figures. Charles W. Galloway, of the state tax commission, cited figures to show the small share of the tax burden which would be carried by corporations and intangibles owners as compared with those paid by real property taxpayers. It was the hope, he said, that the present tax program, with the income tax already approved by the legislature, would relieve the tangible property owners of some taxation by shifting a portion of the burden to those "more able to pay." He also gave comparisons showing Oregon's proposed tax is not as high or higher than in many other states.

"We are facing an emergency," the governor said in expressing his views to the delegation and in reply to their protest. "And every business must contribute to support state institutions. Everytime a tax measure comes up, there is an organization formed to fight it. I must admit that I have contributed to such organizations."

"But now I see a different picture. Farmers are almost in rebellion. You may not realize it, but you are playing with fire. I cannot take much stock in this talk of established industries moving out of the state because of tax reasons. The thing to do for us who are at fault is to pay the tax for two or four years until we have passed this emergency."

Cowhand of 14 Years Is Revealed As a Woman

BLACKWELL, Okla., Feb. 28, (AP)—"Jack" Carlton, bronzed cowhand employed several years on ranches in the vicinity of Midland, Tex., was revealed today as a woman.

Mrs. J. L. Jones, head of Tonkawa, Okla., charities, said hunger had accomplished what years of hazards on the range could not in forcing the "cowboy" to admit her identity as Grace Carlton, part white daughter of a Cherokee Indian woman.

Dressed in man's garments, Grace Carlton, "just wandered up this way" after losing a job in Texas. She said she was unable to find work and appealed to the Associated Charities for food. Questioning, Mrs. Jones said, ended a masquerade of fourteen years standing.

E. J. Post, superintendent of the Ponca City Five Tribes agency, said he would investigate today to determine whether the woman was a ward of the government.

ATTORNEY FOR LUPER PLANS FOR DEFENSE

SALEM, Ore., Feb. 28, (AP)—Oscar Hayer of Dallas, attorney for Rhea Luper, former state engineer under indictment here on a charge of larceny of public money, stated today he would attack the validity of the indictment by attacking the authority of the grand jury which made the indictment. Hayer was having made a complete transcript of the court record here as to the grand jury to use in connection with his attack on the right of the present grand jury to return an indictment.

This grand jury was empaneled in the October term of circuit court last year and started its actual duties during the November term. The court records, he states, fail to reveal that Judge McMahon ever issued an order continuing the grand jury from the October term to the November term and Luper attorneys will contend that the grand jury was automatically discharged with the termination of the October term of court unless Judge McMahon issued an order continuing it over to the succeeding term.

The attack will be of added importance as the present grand jury has had an auditor busy for many weeks going into the fiscal affairs of many state and county offices and an extensive report is expected when one is forthcoming.

A few days since Judge McMahon issued an order declaring the present grand jury to remain in session until the July term of circuit court. The jury at present is taking a recess until March 9.

SENATE FAVORS PRIVILEGE TAX

SALEM, Feb. 28, (AP)—When the senate today accepted the house amendments to Senator J. E. Bennett's bill providing for a privilege tax upon utilities operating without franchise in cities, the measure was strengthened far beyond the expectations of its author.

As introduced the measure authorized a privilege tax of not less than 5 per cent on gross earnings. This provision remains in the bill. As amended in the senate, the tax is to be based on "double amounts," to use Bennett's phrase, by providing that the poles, wires and other equipment shall be removed by the utility, when ordered by the governing body of the municipality, within one year after expiration of the privilege or franchise, unless further time be granted by the municipality. If not removed as ordered the equipment shall be forfeited to the municipality.

If the franchise has expired prior to the time the act takes effect the time for removal shall run from the effective date of the act.

The bill strikes particularly at the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph company in Portland where the utility has been operating for about five years without franchise.

Idaho Governor To Veto Divorce Bill

BOISE, Idaho, Feb. 28, (AP)—Governor C. Ben Ross announced today he would veto the 90-day divorce bill passed by the legislature.

Governor Ross told newspaper men he was vetoing the bill because of "very fixed principles of what is proper in the relations between the executive and the legislature."

"An executive should sign a bill passed by the legislature," he said, "unless he can find some very sound reason why he should not. I have found that reason, and will give it in my veto message to the legislature."

STATE CLOSES BRIDGE GAME MURDER CASE

KANSAS CITY, Feb. 28, (AP)—The state rested today in the trial of Mrs. Myrtle A. Bennett, 35, for the slaying of her husband, John G. Bennett, following a bridge game quarrel.

Photographs showing the interior of the Bennett apartment in which the slaying occurred September 29, 1935, were introduced as the prosecution concluded its direct evidence.

Defense counsel, headed by ex-Senator James A. Reed and J. Francis O'Sullivan, declined to say whether the wife, thus far silent, would testify.

The defense allegation that the death of Bennett, a wealthy business man, in his apartment the night of September 29, 1935, was an accident, was met by the testimony of Mrs. Anna Rise of West Frankfort, Ill., his half-sister.

While the defendant watched her husband play bridge, Mrs. Bennett had told her she would "keep the motive secret until after the trial," she asserted Mrs. Bennett had said:

"Nobody but me and my God knows why I did it. But I'll tell, Annie, when this is all over."

Reed protested the introduction of the testimony of Mrs. Rise as a surprise witness. He demonstrated by questioning that she suffered from deafness.

A word battle between O'Sullivan and Reed, a prosecutor 20 years ago in the courtroom in which he now is fighting for a woman's freedom, was interrupted by Stanley M. Hall, deputy coroner, the statement the two shots that killed Bennett might have been fired accidentally.

Willette Henry, negro maid, testified she heard four shots.

George R. Woodson, patrolman, testified Mrs. Bennett, weeping and hysterical beside her husband's body, exclaimed: "Jack, why did you do it, why did you do it?" and later said, "If Jack's gone, I want to go too."

her room, but that she refused to receive any of them.

Registering at the hotel, she informed some employee that this was her first visit to Klamath Falls, but added that she had been in the city four days, which indicates that she had roomed at some other hotel or lodging house prior to going to the Willard.

Dinner is Uneaten. Her dinner was carried to her on a tray by a bellboy, and the woman was still on the tray when officers entered the room and discovered the tragedy. Apparently she had partaken of none of the food.

Later, it is said, but not verified, that she ordered a bottle of ginger ale which was delivered to her room by a bellboy. Although the spread and an extra blanket at the foot of the bed were soaked in blood, and it appeared that the woman may have fallen over on the bed in her dying state and later rolled to the floor. Large splashes of blood were also found on the carpet under the bed.

Room Not Disarranged. A water glass, blood-covered, was found on the floor, and a smoking stand on the side of the bed on which the woman fell to the floor, was found overturned and leaned against a table upon which rested the tray with her dinner. There were no appearances of a struggle.

The room was not badly disarranged, and appearances indicated that the bed had not been occupied. The covers were turned down at one corner, but the general appearance indicated that no one had slept beneath them, although the spread and an extra blanket at the foot of the bed were soaked in blood, and it appeared that the woman may have fallen over on the bed in her dying state and later rolled to the floor. Large splashes of blood were also found on the carpet under the bed.

Man Accused Of Murder Demands Court Hearing. PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 28, (A. P.)—Bert McDonald, held on a federal warrant charging him with the murder of G. P. Marshall during an attempted robbery in Alaskan waters last October 20, demanded a hearing when arraigned before the United States commissioner here today, and the case was continued.

The United States marshal's office said the hearing would be granted as soon as it is possible to bring witnesses from Alaska. McDonald was arrested last week at the Veterans' hospital here, where he was being examined. The complaint alleges he killed Marshall at or near Point Higgins in the vicinity of Ketchikan, Alaska.

HOLLYWOOD, Calif., Feb. 28, (AP)—William H. Boyd, 45, stage and film actor, was charged with possession of gambling paraphernalia and liquor following a police raid which broke up a gay party at his home early today.

Men and women in evening dress, many of them said by officers to be film players, fled through doors and windows as six police under Lt. James Johnson burst in upon what they described as a "well equipped gambling room and richly furnished bar."

Roulette wheels and dice tables were among the equipment seized. They also confiscated "more than a gallon" of liquor. No attempt was made to arrest the fleeing guests.

Boyd formerly played on the New York stage but has appeared in a number of motion pictures in the past two years. He and his wife, Dora Boyd, New York actress, were divorced last November. The actor recently was arrested on a reckless driving charge at Oceanside. One of his most recent film parts was in "The Spoilers," a talkie version of the Rex Beach novel.

The police disclosed later they had seized a home motion picture projection machine and films showing nude subjects, and had added a charge against Boyd of possessing obscene pictures. They quoted him as saying he was entertaining guests, following the completion of a motion picture.

Hollywood's other William Boyd came to motion picture fame from Tulsa, Okla. While the two do not resemble each other, their names have been the source of constant confusion and at one time, so the press agents said, each tried to get the other to change names without result.

The Tulsa William Boyd has been in the films for 13 years and among the better known pictures he has played in are "Two Arabian Knights," "The Volga Boatman," "Leatherneck" and "Officer O'Brien."

The most extensive improvement considered was urged by Senator William F. Woodward as chairman of a sub-committee detailed to investigate the prison. This plan totaled a financial outlay of \$302,500 in addition to the requested budget. It included \$75,000 to buy 1500 acres of land for a future new prison plant.

Salary Item Cut. Senator W. E. Burke believed the fire hazard could be eliminated by allowing the requested appropriation and approving Representative Herbert Gordon's bill which would appropriate \$75,000 to fire-proof the main building.

The committee cut \$3000 from the salary item of the public service commission, believing this could be saved by the administration bill making a one-man commission instead of the present three-man commission. The total approved was \$15,947.

The sum of \$26,742 was added to the state insane hospital request to cover a ward for tubercular inmates and additional operating costs. The total allowed was \$1,027,292.
