

MONEY VOTED INSTITUTIONS IN LA GRANDE

SALEM, March 5, (AP)—Only the official pen of Governor Julius L. Meier can now block \$90,000 in building appropriations for the city of La Grande that have completed their passage through the legislature. Late yesterday afternoon the senate passed house bill 70, appropriating \$40,000 for a state armory at La Grande, and last night it passed house bill 409 appropriating \$50,000 for a training school to be operated with the state normal school in that city.

Both bills were debated, the latter, along with the general education bill, being a special order at the night session. Should the governor veto the armory bill its sponsors might have difficulty in mustering the necessary two-thirds senate vote to pass it over the veto, for there were nine negative votes and Senator Charles K. Spaulding of Marion, who often votes against appropriation bills, was absent. The negative votes were Bennett of Multnomah, Brown of Marion, Burke of Yamhill, Dunn of Jackson, Eddy of Douglas, Jones of Clackamas, Schulmerich of Washington, Staples of Multnomah and President Marks of Linn.

The school bill apparently would have a better chance to override a veto since only seven voted against it. They were Brown of Marion, Burke of Yamhill, Crawford of Multnomah, Fisher of Lincoln, Jones of Clackamas, Schulmerich of Washington and Spaulding of Marion.

The armory is an \$80,000 project, the city having voted \$23,000 in bonds and the La Grande American Legion Post having \$12,000 to apply. For the training school the La Grande school district has set aside \$80,000 to add to the appropriation.

Senator Ferd E. Kiddle of Union county made the opening and closing of the armory bill. Senators Burke and Bennett fought it on the floor. Senator H. C. Wheeler of Lane urged western Oregon members to support it, declaring that "since western Oregon counties have been favored with so many armories it is no more than fair that the Willamette Valley members support the bill," and Senator J. C. Booth of Linn, supporting the bill, mention that western Oregon has 12 armories and eastern Oregon none. Senators Joe E. Dunne and William F. Woodward of Multnomah spoke for it, the former terming it a good business investment.

Senator Colon R. Eberhard, speaking in behalf of the new school enterprise, urged the senate, as the house had done previously, to give the bill its unanimous approval.

The bill was attacked by Senator Ed Schulmerich of Washington county who declared that it had not been necessary for either the Ashland or the La Grande institutions to be established, and that the Monmouth school alone was furnishing more teachers than the state needed.

Portland To Vote On Big Bond Issues

PORTLAND, March 5 (AP)—Bond issues totaling two million dollars, the money to be used to relieve unemployment, will be voted upon by residents of Portland and of Multnomah county at a special election to be held April 10.

The date was agreed upon at a special meeting of the city council last night, and the county commission was expected to concur today, as an agreement already has been reached.

Polling places will be donated and volunteer judges and clerks will serve at the election.

The bond issue was suggested by the civic emergency committee, organized last November to aid government agencies and individuals in rendering relief to idle men and women. Legislative sanction was given by the house and senate, and Governor Meier is expected to sign the bill authorizing the election as soon as it reaches his desk.

Aaron M. Frank, member of the emergency committee, said most of the money will go for labor.

DAUGHERTY GUILTY ON FIVE COUNTS

WASHINGTON COURT HOUSE, O., March 5, (AP)—Jury S. Daugherty, brother of former United States Attorney General Harry M. Daugherty and a figure in the senate's investigation of oil land leases several years ago, today faced a prison sentence for attracting funds while president of the closed Ohio State bank.

Daugherty was found guilty late yesterday by a Fayette county jury which required but one ballot. The 55-year-old former banker, whose three weeks' trial was interrupted by the death of his aged mother, sat unmoved as he heard the verdict.

His attorneys announced a motion for a new trial will be filed, pending which his sentence will be delayed. He was found guilty on all five counts of the indictment, each of which carries a maximum sentence of 10 years imprisonment and a fine of \$10,000.

Daugherty came into national attention a few years ago when as president of the Midland National bank he refused a senate commission permission to inspect the books in a hunt for alleged bribe money in government oil deals. He was cited for contempt of the senate, but was never prosecuted. The Midland and two other banks were later merged to form the Ohio State bank.
