

ARRESTS ARE OUTGROWTH OF 'LOVE MARKET'

LOS ANGELES, March 6, (A.P.)—Two men and a woman faced arraignment in superior court today on charges growing out of the alleged operation of a Hollywood "love market."

A card index of more than 100 girls, ranging from 16 to 30 years in age, and another of clients listing some of the best known men of wealth in the city was found in the Hollywood studio of William H. Jodelmann, 34, former publicity agent, District Attorney Burton Pitts said.

Pitts charged John P. Mills, wealthy Los Angeles and San Diego broker, with two attacks on Clarice Tauber, 16. He was released under a \$5,000 bond and was to be arraigned today with Jodelmann and Olive Clark Day, 24, former actress, who were charged with complicity in the offense. Jodelmann and Miss Day were held in jail.

Five girl victims of the alleged market were in technical custody, one being treated in a hospital and others were released to their parents. Pitts said other arrests of men clients may follow.

Complaint against Mills was made by Mrs. Rose Tauber, mother of Clarice. Miss Day was charged with interviewing girls for listing with Jodelmann.

Miss Day, as Dorothy Clark, was plaintiff in a suit filed in 1923 against Herbert Rawlinson, motion picture actor, charging him with assault. The complaint was dismissed a year later.

Leaves "Pin Money" For First Lady Of The Land

PHILADELPHIA, March 6, (A.P.)—An annuity of \$12,000 to supply "pin money" for the "first lady of the land" was provided in the will of Henry G. Freeman Jr., owner of a large parcel of Philadelphia real estate, who died in October, 1917.

This was revealed today, when the Fidelity-Philadelphia Trust company, executors and trustees, began an accounting because of the death of a son, William McLain Freeman, survivor of two children, who were life tenants of the residue of Henry Freeman's \$2,000,000 estate.

Whether Mrs. Herbert Hoover would receive the annuity, should it be acceptable, and whether disposition of the residue to three institutions would be made in accordance with the will of the son, depend upon several questions that the orphan's home must decide.

The annuity to the "first lady" is to be known as the "Henry G. Freeman Jr. pin money fund," and "shall continue in force as long as this glorious government lasts," the will provides.

Baptists Initiate Drive To Enlarge School Attendance

Ellis A. Chamberlain of Redway, Calif., is leading the First Baptist Sunday school organization in an enlargement campaign. Mr. Chamberlain is a young man, and has the ability, leadership and initiative.

From all statistics gathered Mr. Chamberlain finds that only 1727 people of Klamath Falls attended Sunday school the first Sunday in March. That number makes up only 8.2 per cent of the population of the town and vicinity.

"This is a challenge," said Mr. Chamberlain, "that every church in town should meet." This campaign is to last through the month of March. The goal for the last Sunday of the month is 250 attending this Sunday school. The enrollment of this exceptional school is above that figure, and the building space is adequate to take care of that many permanently with the recent enlargement made to the building.

"This is one of the most elaborate organizations in the state," Mr. Chamberlain said, as he viewed the machinery of this school.

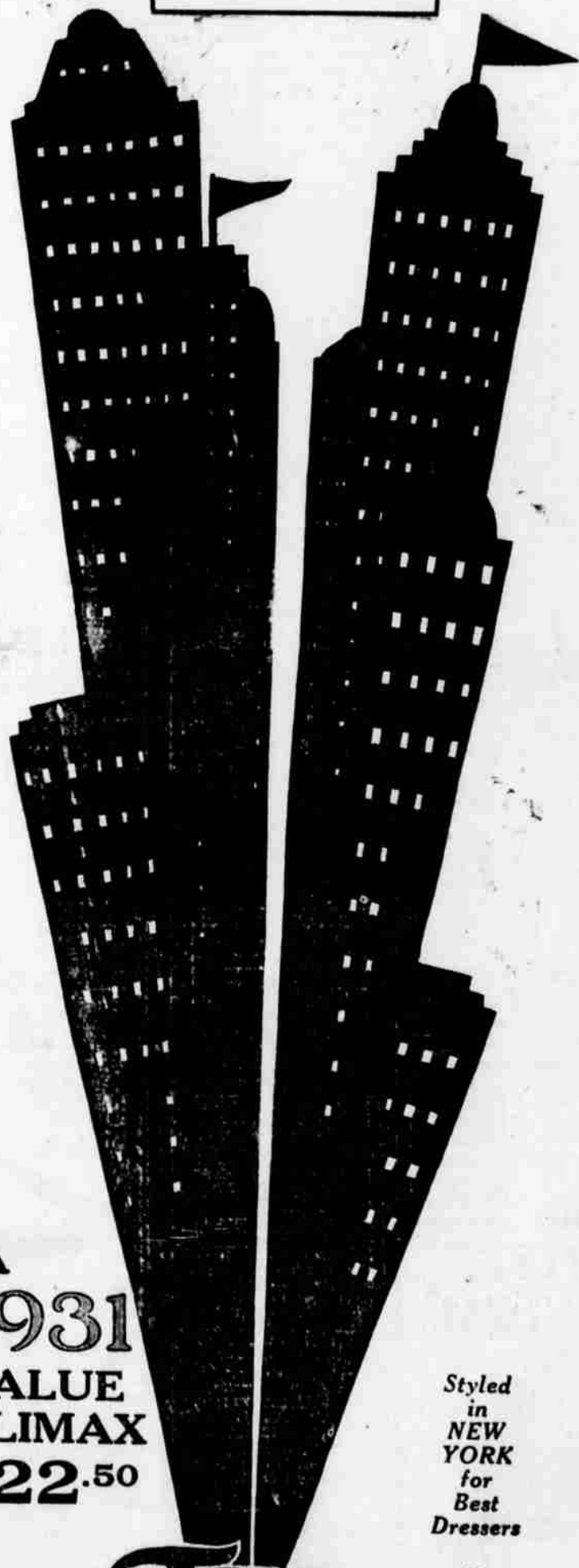
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
