EGGS: Weak, quotations unchanged.

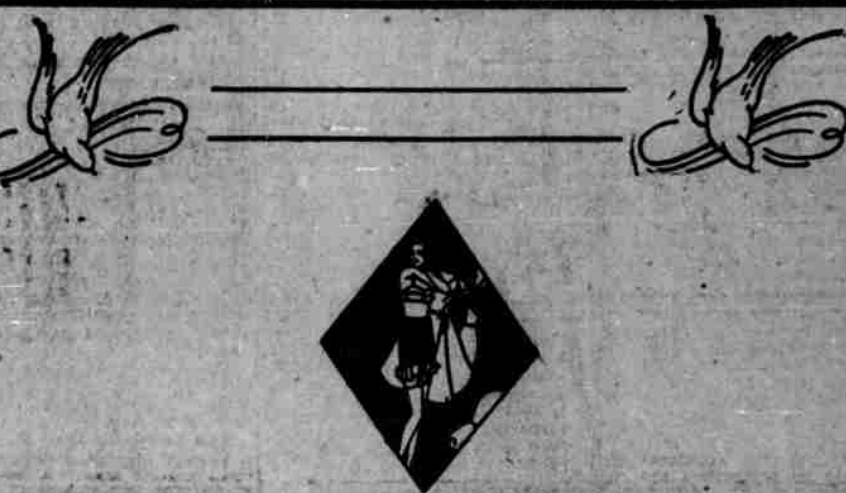

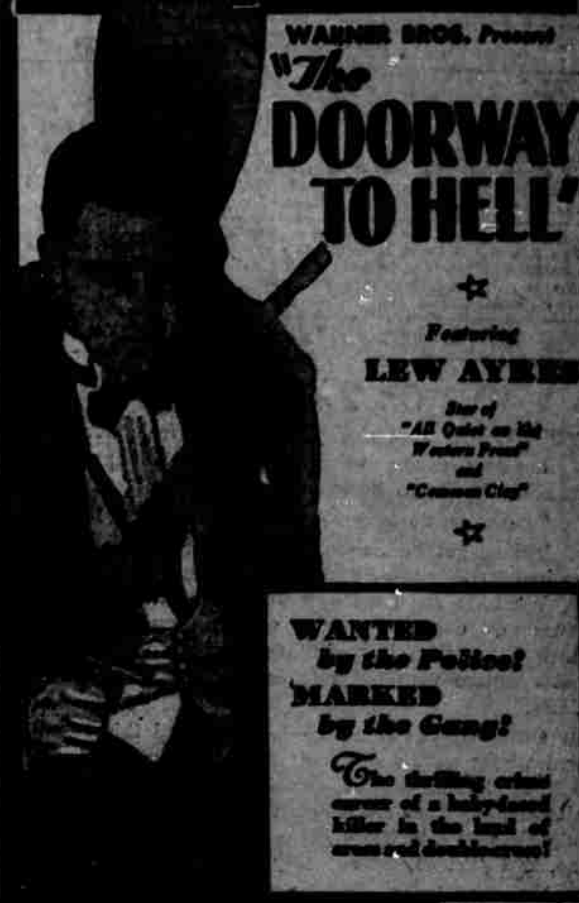
