Attorney General Rules For State Game Department

SALEM, March 13. (AP)—A person who while hunting has unintentionally killed or injured another, may not be issued a hunting license or be reinstated by the game commission to rights forfeited by the act. Attorney General L. H. Van Winkle held in an opinion made public today. The opinion was requested by H. L. Moreland, state game warden. Van Winkle stated he found no authority, expressed or implied, authorizing the state game commission to remit forfeiture imposed on a party who has killed or injured another, even though no intent could be shown, and that issuing a hunting license to such party would be ineffective as the law prohibits him from carrying firearms.

SLAYER MUST GO TO PRISON

INDIANAPOLIS, March 13. (AP)—Convicted of voluntary manslaughter for the death of an unknown hitch-hiker whose body he admitted burning in his automobile near here last May, Harold Herbert Schroeder, Mobile, Ala., today faced a 2 to 21 year term in the Indiana state prison.

He will be sentenced Monday. The verdict was reached by a jury after three hours 35 minutes deliberation. The state had sought conviction of first degree murder and imposition of the death penalty.

Only three witnesses were presented in defense of the 35-year-old Mobile garage man, against 37 used by the state. In addition to its technical plea of insanity, the defense stressed Schroeder's own story, brought out in state testimony, that the hitch-hiker was killed when Schroeder's automobile went into a ditch 35 miles west of Terre Haute, Ind., and that fearing he would be accused of murder, he drove back towards Indianapolis, and set the body afire in the automobile.

The state contended Schroeder intended it to be assumed he himself died in the fire, so he could resume his life under another name. Testimony of a deputy coroner tended to show the victim was stabbed before his body was burned, and former sheriff Winkler said Schroeder admitted the hitch-hiker moaned just before he set fire to the body.
