

MOELLER IS SPEAKER AT ROTARY CLUB

Vice President Andrew Collier presided at the Rotary Club luncheon in the Pelican Grill in the absence of President Dunn and started the weekly luncheon. Bert Hall commented on the late inter-city meet. Herb Hauger told of the same Rotarians were acquiring as trap shooters but stoutly denied that he is in the winning class as a shooter himself.

Fred Fleet presided as chairman of the luncheon and introduced Oscar Moeller, of the Klamath Flower Shop, who gave a very interesting talk on flowers. This being national flower week Mr. Moeller spoke with emphasis on the good being done by "saying it with flowers." He gave interesting data on what is known as Floral Telegraph delivery, which means flowers can now be delivered in any part of the civilized world by telegraph or cable.

He said in 1905 Detroit florists started the idea of wiring orders for flowers to other florists in different parts of the country. There are now 1574 cities in the United States with 4,390 florists and throughout the world there are 7,000 florists under bond to deliver telegraphic orders exactly as received. A clearing house for this business has been created and in the last eight years it has increased 310 per cent. Last year, according to Mr. Moeller \$5,982,485 was spent by the people of this nation for flowers and the average order amounted to \$5.40.

New Royal Babe Is Christened with Splendor

TOKYO, March 12. (AP)—Japan's thirteenth bit of royalty was christened Yori Atsuko today on the seventh day after the princess' birth and shortly thereafter, in strict accordance with time-honored rites, Emperor Hirohito had duly reported the name to the spirits of the imperial ancestors.

The name was chosen from the ancient Japanese scriptures, Hori meaning obedience to Heaven and Atsuko meaning generosity to those on earth.

Princess Yori is the fourth daughter born to their imperial majesties, Emperor Hirohito and Empress Nagako. The sovereign is without a direct heir to succeed him on the throne of "the line unbroken for ages eternal." The rejoicing of the past week has been tempered somewhat by the hardly veiled disappointment that the new arrival could not have been welcomed as crown prince.

The name Yori Atsuko was chosen by the princess' father.

Early this morning the infant was given a ceremonial bath in a newly wrought tub of Hinoki (cypress) wood. Several ladies of the court were in attendance. Adjoining the bathroom, in a special chamber, two historians chosen for the honor because of their erudition, read in stentorian tones a passage from the Nihon Shoki, the ancient history of the imperial house.

Simultaneously four high noblemen, garbed in the dress of the ancient court, twanged bowstrings, an archaic rite intended to drive all evil influences out of the life of the imperial infant.

Vatican Will Not Oppose Unofficial Visit to Holy Land

VATICAN CITY, March 12. (AP)—It was said unofficially today that the Vatican would not oppose the Archbishop of Canterbury's intended visit to the Holy Land if he made the visit privately as one of the many pilgrims of every Christian faith who go to the Holy Land at Easter or other seasons.

It was repeated, however, that an official visit by the archbishop would create a difficult situation, since it might establish a precedent which would permit its repetition indefinitely.

The archbishop planned to be the guest of J. F. Morgan, on whose yacht he is cruising in the Mediterranean, at a visit to the Holy Sepulchre in Jerusalem which is guarded by the Catholic, Greek, Armenian and Coptic religions. The holy one had made representations to the British government suggesting difficulties which might arise from such a visit.

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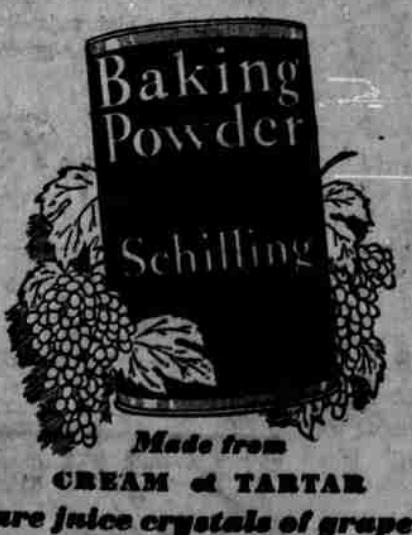
