

BULLET STOPS A FORMER CON

SALEM, March 12. (AP)—Records at the state penitentiary here show that Harold Woodward, alleged "petting party" bandit who was stopped by an officer's bullet in San Francisco last night, served two terms in the Oregon prison, having been sentenced once in Josephine and once in Multnomah county. He was discharged last September after receiving a commutation of sentence by Governor Norblad.

Woodward, the records show, was received at the prison in January 1927, for automobile theft, under the name of Stuart Younan. He served a year. He was next received from Multnomah county in January 1928, to serve 11 years for robbery while armed with a dangerous weapon. He was only 19 years old at the time and used the name of H. Philip Woodward.

Because of Woodward's youth his sentence was commuted to four years by Governor Norblad on recommendation of Judge W. A. Ekwall and District Attorney Stanley Myers of Multnomah county and the former of the grand jury that indicted him. A condition of the commutation was that he return to his parents in California.

Police Department Is Supplied With Photo Equipment

General photograph equipment, including cameras, lenses of several types and a ray filter for the lenses, has been received at police headquarters.

The police department will now be able to copy photographs and fingerprints, as well as make originals for permanent records. The photography department will be in charge of Desk Sergeant Ackerman, at least temporarily.

The new camera equipment includes a fast lens for making copies of photographs and finger prints, and also a lens with wide angles for taking accurate photographs of scenes of crime.

The equipment is complete, and it is said has been much needed by the police department for some time, as all photographic work has heretofore been done by the county.

5 OF BOWLES JURY ARE ILL

HILLSBORO, Ore., March 12. (AP)—With five jurors on the sick list there was a possibility today of further postponement in the murder trial of Nelson C. Bowles and Miss Irma Loucks, accused of the murder of Bowles' wife, prominent Portland society matron.

A recess was taken last Wednesday when Emil Egger and John A. Benefield were stricken with influenza. Harold Cutting then became ill, and last night Oscar S. Dallman and Philo R. Dickinson were attacked by the disease. All have been isolated from the rest of the panel.

In calling the recess until Monday Judge George R. Bazley ordered that the jury be kept together, although the ill men were confined to a separate room. Bowles, a wealthy Portlander, and Miss Loucks, his former secretary, are charged with killing Mrs. Leone Bowles, who was stabbed to death in Miss Loucks' apartment last Nov. 12.

Medford Pilot of PAT Given Award

PORTLAND, March 12. (AP)—Grover C. Tyler, Medford, pilot who carries the southbound mail, was today awarded the \$100 prize given monthly by the Chicago Daily News for meritorious flying.

On March 2, his plane afloat, Tyler made a skilful landing 20 miles east of Roseburg. No one was seriously hurt, and little of the 275 pounds of mail destroyed.
