

A ROMANCE OF THE COW RANGE IS SHATTERED

RENO, Nev., March 12. (AP)—The romance of a New York society girl and a Colorado cowboy has led to Reno.

Barbara Monell Glaze, 26, was here today with the announced intention of obtaining a divorce from Kenneth Wilson Glaze, 30-year-old rodeo performer and harness maker to whom she was married February 21, 1928.

The daughter and heiress of Ambrose Monell, former head of the International Nickel company who left a \$15,000,000 estate, did not reveal the basis of her suit.

"It's a matter I just can't discuss right now," said Roy W. Stoddard, her attorney.

Miss Monell's plunge into matrimony started society circles just as she astonished Newport habitués at the age of 14 by swimming two miles in the surf. Her widowed mother, however, approved the bridegroom as a "splendid young man."

Glaze was a stalwart 6-foot "broncho rider" cowboy, who, after seven years on the range, had purchased a 1-room harness shop in Colorado Springs with proceeds of the sale of a band of horses.

Their romance was born of business. Miss Monell, pretty horsewoman and sports enthusiast recuperating in Colorado Springs following an operation, strolled into Glaze's shop one day seeking a muzzle for a dog. Glaze welcomed her custom.

They were married five weeks later in Grace and St. Stephen's Episcopal church there. There was no honeymoon. Soon they went to live on a cattle ranch near South Park, Colo., Glaze's old "stomping ground."

The neighbors liked the bride. They indulged her expressions that she preferred the "ho-men" of the west to the men of the east. There was no outward evidence of marital trouble.

National Parks Are Held Laboratories For Valuable Study

WASHINGTON, March 12. (AP)—America's national parks were described today by Director Albright of the park service as great national laboratories for studying geological and other natural phenomena at first hand.

Albright said in a radio address geology, zoology, botany and paleontology and their riddles were presented on all sides. The story of the origin of the earth, he declared, was written in the twisted layers in the walls of the Grand Canyon.

At Yosemite, Albright said, one sees the results of glacial erosion, and at Mt. Rainier and Glacial parks, one may watch the glaciers at work.

"In many instances, disappearing animal species are making their last stand within the sanctuary afforded by the park systems," Albright said, naming the trumpeter swan, the wolverine, the buffalo and the elk.
