SALEM, March 14. (AP)—Hal E. Hoss, secretary of state in a statement issued today on the changes effected by the state legislature in traffic laws, said: "I am assured by Governor Meier that he intends to keep all competent officers for service in the new state police organization."

The state police system will become operative August 1, and will include the traffic department along with four other law enforcement agencies. The traffic department has been under supervision of the secretary of state.

Limited his statement to agreeing with Norris that a third party is inadvisable and to saying numerous policies suggested by progressives at their conference here earlier this week "were in complete harmony with the course and attitude of most of the great democratic rank and file."

Robinson or Roosevelt.

Senator Caraway, democrat, Arkansas, said if the democrats do not choose his colleague, Senator Robinson, he would like to see Governor Roosevelt of New York in the race. Norris has explained he did not have that governor in mind when he mentioned "another Roosevelt."

While this warring continued, house progressives said they would demand enactment of legislation they will draw between now and the next session, when their votes will beat tremendous weight in the organization. Representative Schneider, republican, Wisconsin, was confident of close adherence of liberals.

Will Force Demands.

Other house progressives repeated demands for liberalization of rules, promising a deadlock if they do not get what they want. They insisted the hard-fought contest over the election of Speaker Gillett in 1923 resulted in enactment of much constructive legislation.

In the senate, some progressives indicated they would combat the recently announced intention of the republican organization to sell the administration to the farm belt. Senator Borah, republican, Idaho, was understood to be ready to take the stump if necessary in opposition to the agricultural advisory council of the republican national committee.

WASHINGTON, March 14. (AP)—The nomination of Governor Franklin D. Roosevelt of New York as democratic presidential candidate in 1932 was advocated today by Senator Wheeler, democrat, Montana, one of the sponsors of the recent progressive conference.

Wheeler said his party must name a progressive candidate in order to win.

Wheeler said if Roosevelt should run against President Hoover tomorrow, Roosevelt would carry the northwest "as Wilson carried it against Hughes."

sell convicted of participating in a bombing ring last October. The outbreak occurred in the dining hall when the prisoners refused to return to their cells after luncheon.

Boos Give Warning.

A chorus of boos and catcalls gave warning of the riot, and the 25 guards in the hall sent an alarm that brought rioters from every part of the prison.

Three convicts attacked Captain B. A. Davenport at the door and were beating him severely when they were felled by shots from other guards.

1000 Horded in Blocks.

The prisoners, although unarmed, held control of the hall and sixty rushed into the kitchen, wrecking it. The remainder of the 1,000 more passive, were herded into their cell blocks but refused to allow themselves to be locked into their own cells. Shots fired over their heads sent them to cover, however, and one prisoner was wounded by a ricocheted bullet.

Wreck Dining Room.

The three score, after smashing everything in the kitchen, returned to the dining hall and demolished tables, chairs and fixtures, throwing furniture thru windows.

Mobilized guards finally subdued the insurgents and 43 men were locked up in solitary confinement piloned to iron bars and legs.

Geologists "Bombarded" By Airplane

VANCOUVER, Wash., March 14. (AP)—Two young geologists, isolated in the snows at the headwaters of the north fork of the Lewis river, were bombarded from the air today—but with food instead of explosives.

Lieutenant Carlton F. Bond, commandant at Pearson Field here, dropped 150 pounds of food at the camp of D. T. Faudon and M. C. Boyer in the Shookum Meadows district 70 miles northwest of Airtel. It was the third time supplies have thus been provided. That the geologists received the first consignment was indicated by a large "O. K." drawn in the deep snow.

The men are measuring the flow of the Lewis river, as part of a government check on the Columbia river and its tributaries.

Hodging Inquest Over Remains of Edw. Armstrong

An inquest into the death of Ed Armstrong who died Thursday evening as a result of injuries sustained last Sunday is being held at the Earl Whitlock Funeral chapel this afternoon with Deputy Coroner Henry V. Jovius presiding.

Jurors are K. G. Klahn, Frank Ward, M. L. Johnson, George E. Mason, R. E. Bradbury and O. W. Spiker.

Dr. Warren Hunt, who attended Armstrong, performed an autopsy Friday afternoon and stated that death resulted from a hemorrhage of the right lung which had been punctured by fractured right ribs. There were also other internal injuries.

There was no fracture or concussion of the brain or skull, the autopsy revealed.

Armstrong died at a local hospital several days after being injured by a car driven by Marvin Rutherford of Pelican City. Rutherford claims that Armstrong was staggering and fell in front of the car and that the accident was unavoidable.

WILL PRODUCE INVERT SUGAR FROM GRAPES

SAN FRANCISCO, March 14. (AP)—Another prospective commercial outlet for California grapes presented itself to growers today in the discovery of Pierre Corippo, International Sugar Corporation president, of a practicable method of manufacturing invert sugar from grapes.

Philippe, who personally supervised experiments during the last six months, said grapes could be made into dry ice, sugar, yeast and alcohol. Limited volumes already have been produced, he said.

Philippe and his collaborator, Richard Spreckels, found they obtained carbon dioxide in the process as a by-product which they converted into ice. The by-product became more important commercially than sugar because of profits. Yeast and alcohol, officials said, also were commercially valuable but of lesser importance.

The sugar company president estimated dry ice would cost \$2 a ton to produce and would be sold at \$120 a ton. The invert sugar, used chiefly by bakers and confectioners, will be produced from a fruit syrup thru a process of clarification and evaporation.

He said all kinds of grapes could be used for fructose production, but those richer in sugar content, such as Sultaninas and Concordas, would be best suited. Tokays, having less sugar content, could not be used. Laboratory production was carried on with concentrates obtained locally. A month ago, a committee of experts reported to the California Grape Control Board, the grape industry, with its \$350,000,000 investments, could be saved by drastic action. Experts advised a vine pulling program.

POINT BARROW, Alaska, March 14. (AP)—The diphtheria scourge had the upper hand again today, but Dr. Henry Grist of the Presbyterian Mission hospital and his wife were fighting back with a renewed spirit and an additional supply of antitoxin.

The number of serious cases had mounted to 24, the only hospital was overflowing and the disease was spreading rapidly. Some of the patients were expected to die. Immunization of the entire population of 300 natives and a dozen whites, including four children, was being rushed with all possible speed.

The new supply of serum was brought here yesterday by pilot Joe Cronin who left immediately on his return trip to Fairbanks. He made a previous flight here with antitoxin and fruits last Sunday. Shortly after the aviator's arrival yesterday, four new cases were reported and the same number took ill the day before.

The epidemic has been raging for two weeks and the number of less serious cases was not known. The disease has been creeping upon the coast since last December by the intermingling of reindeer herds and at first was believed only toasts.

The negroes next went to the home of John W. Midkiff, where they tied and gagged Midkiff, his wife, their son Alfred and Mr. and Mrs. Harry Mason. After cutting telephone wires and taking cash and jewelry, the robbers left, saying they were going to rob the house next door.

The neighbor, Arthur Morgan, saw the pair pull handkerchiefs over their faces as they came up the walk, and called to his wife to bring him his pistol. As she complied, Mrs. Morgan accidentally discharged the weapon, and the robbers turned and fled. Morgan then released the Midkiffs.

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CONCENTRATE SEARCH FOR GIRL SLAYER

SAN DIEGO, Calif., (AP)—State, county and city officers organized today under a central office for a concentrated drive to bring to justice the brutal slayer of Virginia Brooks.

Herbert Oglesby, 36, home-stender of the Lakeside district near here, was being questioned at El Centro, Calif. A youth who aroused the suspicion of Mr. and Mrs. John Brooks, parents of the 10-year-old school girl whose dismembered body was found Tuesday in a gunny sack on Camp Kearney Mesa was being sought. Two other men held on robbery charges one at Salinas, Calif., and the other at Oklahoma City, had been practically eliminated as suspects in the fiendish killing.

Tex Welch, Los Angeles police chemist, expressed belief Virginia was strangled to death with a silk scarf which was found with her body, twisted and knotted as though it had been subjected to strain.
